Rutherford Mill On Full Schedule Rutherford Manufacturing Plants Striking Normal Stride After Lull. Forest City, Feb. 25.—All of Rutherford county's mills are now beginning to operate upon a full-time schedule. The manufacturing plants at Spindale have been running full time for several weeks while the Florence Mills at Forest City, have also been operating upon a full time basis for several months. Following several weeks of curtailment, the Cliffside mills, at Cliffside, have resumed operation upon a full-time basis, and it is the plan of officials to hold to this schedule indefinitely. The Alexander Manufacturing company, of near Forest City, has started back on a full time schedule and is now employing its normal working force. Officials expect to maintain a full time schedule. The plant of the Ellenboro Manufacturing company, at Ellenboro, is being thoroughly overhauled and operations are expected to start up within a few days.

Gardner's Road Bill By House; Is Praised

Former Governor Harry Byrd Says Gardner Program To Save Big Sum. Raleigh, Feb. 25.—Former Governor Harry Flood Byrd, of Virginia, yesterday morning saw the house of representatives pass by a majority of 89 over 16 the administration road bill and then walked into the joint session of the general assembly to tell it that it had done something which all the sister states will copy. The sailing brother of Dick Byrd, famous airman and explorer, talked more than an hour on the reorganization of government. The Virginian found himself in hearty accord with the administration measures and gave the benefit of his own experience to an assembly still uncertain about several of the proposals before it. The address of an exceptional business man out of his own administration of a reorganized state made a great impression on the gathering. Bill Passes Easily. The final passage of the Gardner bill was very easy. There was not a speech made and again a record was broken by a house which did not have a member who wished to explain his vote. The round robin had gone to roost. The signers of that memorial evaporated and fell over themselves to join Governor Gardner in his program. The overwhelming character of the vote seems to assure immediate passage in the senate. At best it is not believed there can be mustered more than 17 votes against the administration. Favors Gardner Plan. Reorganization of state government as a means of reducing taxes and to provide greater efficiency in administration of governmental affairs was urged before the assembly by Governor Byrd. The Virginian, reviewing the experience of his state under his leadership and that of Governor John Garland Pollard, said an annual savings of \$800,000 had been effected by reorganization of the Virginia government. Approves Road Bill. Governor Byrd termed the passage by the house of the Gardner road bill "real constructive work." He urged the adoption of a system of government "with real authority at its head." "I hope you will adopt this system," Byrd continued. "Elect the best man governor. Give him authority to appoint his subordinates and then hold him responsible. If the governor appoints an unfit man, his confirmation can be denied." Byrd, pointing to past accomplishments of North Carolina, said he did not believe "any state has had three
