BILL STRIKES AT COMMUNIST RIOTS

Raleigh—Aimed at Communist teachings such as Gastonia experienced during the Lory mill strike two years ago. Representative Cherry of Gaston introduced a measure in the house defining criminal syndicalism and sabotage and providing punishment therefor.

Criminal syndicalism was defined in the bill as "the doctrine which advocates or teaches crime, sabotage, violence or unlawful methods of terrorism as means of accomplishing any industrial or political change" and sabotage "as defined as "wilful and malicious damage or injury to property."

Advocacy or teaching of such doctrine would be declared a felony punishable by imprisonment for not more than 10 years or a fine of not more than \$5,000 or both.

Mr. and Mrs. Coleman Brooks and little daughter, Mildred, visited Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Glascoe Wednesday morning.

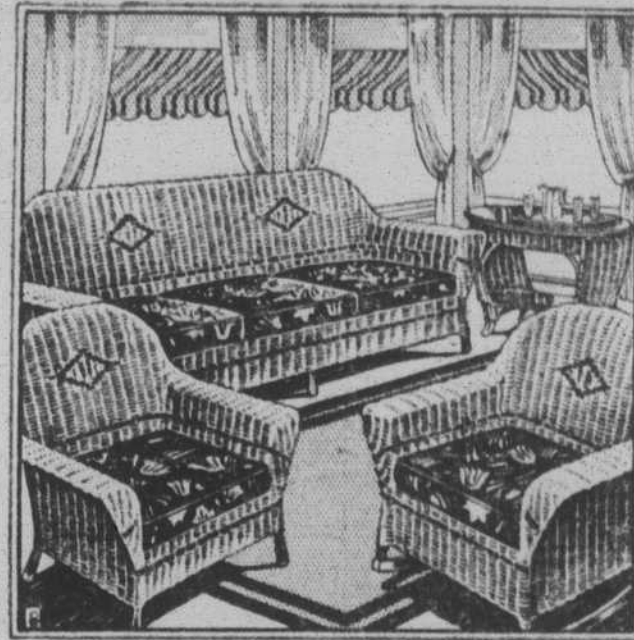
Mr. and Mrs. Bill Glascoe from Double Springs are visiting their parents this week. Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Glascoe.
