## Schooner May Be Lost.

Buenos Aires, March 5.—This city was gaily dressed today to receive the Princes of Wales and Prince George, arriving at El Palomar Air-drome from Mar Del Plata.

The Royal visitors will come by train from El Palomar, accompanied by high government officials and the British ambassador.

The party will proceed directly to the embassy. The two princes then will call on President Uriburu, who a half hour later will return the visit.

This evening President Uriburu will entertain the princes at a banquet at which 150 guests will be present.
