Ellenboro Farmers To Meet. Corrosive Sublimato To Be Given Free.

Ellenboro, Mar. 17.—For the purpose of distributing corrosive sublimato to be used in treating sweet potato seed before bedding, and to discuss timely sweet potato problems a meeting of Ellenboro sweet potato growers is called for Saturday afternoon at 2 p. m. in the center of the town.

The local agricultural teacher has received a shipment of the material to treat the seed and will distribute it to the farmers at cost during the course of the meeting. Then, questions on treating, bedding and fertilizing will be discussed.

Each grower who expects to grow sweet potatoes for the market next year is urged to be present.
