But everything's all right now with the poultry. They seem perfectly happy, especially the roosters. They enjoy scratching all of the excelsior and hay out of the nests and otherwise disturbing the peace and tranquility of the yard. So far, I am out only \$89.92, and we have eaten several eggs and 2 hens. A broiler looks very much (at present) like a July breakfast to me. There are thousands of other fools in the country besides us.
