It Was Garfield, Not. Pres. Harrison

Mr. Gaither Higgins, a close reader of The Star and one well versed in history, called The Star's attention to an error which appeared in Monday's issue. The old copy of The Kansas City Weekly Times dated July 7th, 1881 noting the attempt to assassinate a president, referred to an attempt on the life of President Garfield instead of President Harrison as was stated. Mr. Higgins clearly remembers how the atrocious act disturbed the public at that time.

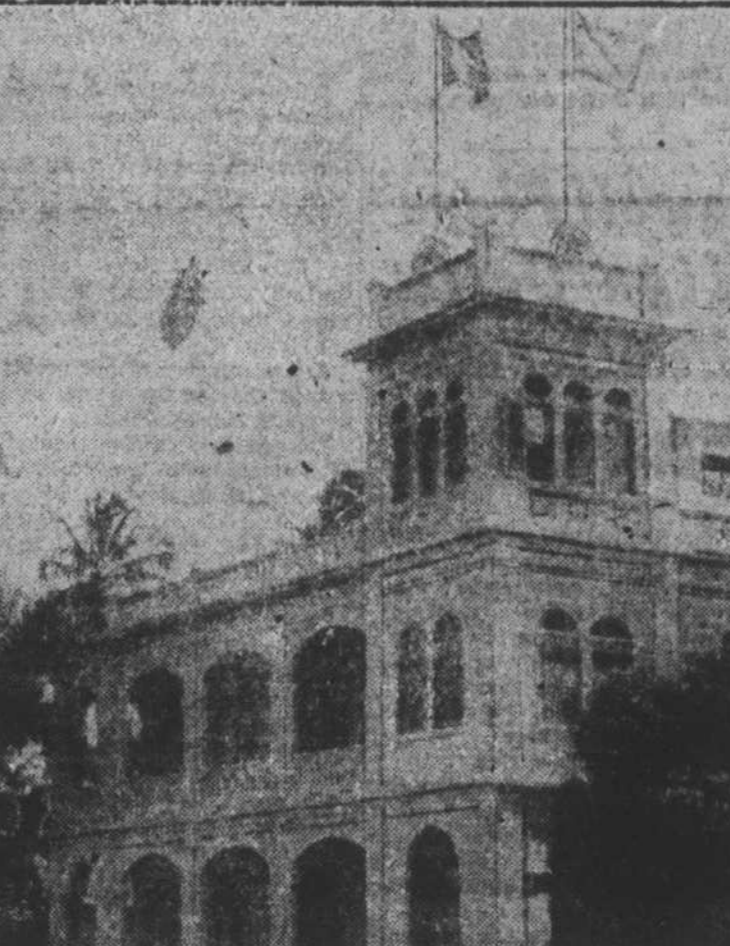
New Style Hats Designed to Glorify the Wearer
