Barrett Drives McSwain Home With Winning Run, Harrill Stars.

A Lowell baseball team out looking for revenge gave the Shelby highs a fit here Friday afternoon and thoroughly entertained fans with an exciting eleven inning contest.

Some weeks ago the Morrismen made 25 runs on Lowell and won hands down, but it was a different story Friday as Shelby came out of the 11 racks with a 6-5 victory.

The Lowell boys slashed out 11 hits to Shelby's nine, but Shelby errors helped keep the local team in hot water, and it was just another afternoon in which the successors to the 1930 champs were not playing heady ball.

Thrills Aplenty.

Lowell came from behind to tie the score in the ninth and go in the lead in the tenth. Shelby knotted it back up in the tenth when Bill Harrill lashed out a triple to score Mayhew. Lowell failed to score in the eleventh and Shelby's chances to do so began to look slim when Shorty McSwain walked and Purp Barrett finally got hold of one to bring McSwain home to win the game.

Mayhew led the hitting for Shelby with two safeties, but the Shelby bats were not clicking as they were against Kings Mountain. Neither was the fielding and pitching anything to write home about. Harrill's snagging of outfield drives, however looked good and save some additional tallies. Somehow the Morrismen, who play good ball away from home, get nervous at home and kick the ball about. At that the fumbles are not all by the new players. The four veterans usually have a hand in it. When Philbeck and Mayhew are not juggling them it is McSwain and Wilson.

Due to an unseasonably cool spring development of bloom this year has been retarded and today the early varieties and a few of the late varieties combine to form a beautiful and colorful display, the first real flower show of azaleas this year.

Several successive days of warm sunshine this week have brought out almost by magic a gorgeous bloom of wisteria and azaleas. The owners of the two gardens now expect the height of bloom between April 15th and 25th.

The major project with the girls in 4-H club work this year is "health." At their first meeting I explained several features that I wished them to do and keep a check on. I also told my leaders of these clubs that those who added more original services as the pledge goes. "For her club, her community and for her country," would be rated as best leader.

She brought a solution of boric acid and a medicine dropper to school and by its universal use, not only cured the cases, already infected, but also put an end to the spread of the contagion so quickly that only a slight inroad was made upon their attendance record.

Service like this must date back further than club, community and country, for here the first service was rendered to the individual and school as well as spreading to the three "C's."

It was worth a great deal to see the smiles that spread over the faces of the club group when Mrs. Jenkins, their principal, told me of Mary Lee's activities. Being a teacher of some experience, she saw that there was danger of my missing the point of perseverance in the task, so she added, "Mary Lee's work was not so easy as it appears at present, for they were not so happy while it was going on as they are now, but that did not deter her, she went through with it whether they liked it or not."

Had Been a Local Preacher. Last Of The Lucas Family. Buried At Oak Grove.

Mr. John P. Lucas, 82 years of age, died at his home in the Folkville community, April 3, where he had lived his entire life. He was a former and local preacher and the Methodist Protestant faith and was held in highest esteem by all who knew him. Mr. Lucas was the son of Peter and Malinda Lucas. He was married to Sara Crowder about fifty-eight years ago. No children survive this union. He was the last of the Lucas family, his two brothers and one sister having preceded him to the grave some years ago.

His closest relatives are his nieces and nephews, C. C. and J. E. Martin, Mrs. R. J. Pendleton, Mrs. Lem Warlick and Mrs. Marvin Bridges. His widow also survives.

Mr. Lucas had been a member of the Methodist Protestant church for more than sixty years. At the time of his death he was a member of Palm Tree church. He was buried in the cemetery at Oak Grove M. P. church on Saturday, April 4, at 3 p. m., the services being in charge of Rev. E. E. Snow, assisted by Rev. C. E. Ridge.
