Sweet Potatoes Need Treatment, County Agent Says

Every bushel of sweet potatoes that is bedded should be treated. The potatoes may be clean, but the soil might contain a disease; therefore very little cost is very essential in treating our potatoes. Mercuric chloride, which is corrosive sublimate, is recommended for the treatment of sweet potatoes. Use this as follows: Four ounces to 2 quarts of hot water to dissolve crystals; then make this up to thirty gallons with cold water; merge the sweet potatoes for eight minutes, remove them from the solution, drain, and bed at once. Rinsing is not necessary.

For good smooth sweet potatoes, they should be grown on deep, sandy loam soil, well drained. The number of plants generally used to the acre varies considerably according to the land and the individual's idea. From nine to twelve thousand plants are generally used; from ten to twelve thousand make a mighty good setting for ordinary land.

Fertilizing of sweet potatoes is very important, as to the analysis, potatoes being a root crop, it requires a large amount of potash. A good formula for sweet potatoes would be 8-4-3 or 8-4-10. The application depends on the soil, but should be used about six hundred to eight hundred pounds to the acre or more if the soil permits, a thousand pounds if necessary.

Jack Dempsey After Divorce From Estelle

Former Champ Says Movie Star Wife Sent Him Away From Her.

Reno, Nev., April 15.—Jack Dempsey, former heavy-weight champion pugilist, is in Reno for a divorce.

Dempsey admitted that he planned to institute suit against his wife, Estelle Taylor of the films. He declared she had put her career above home life and her desire had wrecked their marital happiness.

"I have not heard from Estelle since I left Los Angeles on March 11," Dempsey said, "I took my clothes and my farewell at her request. It was she who said 'we are through'."

He said he still loved his wife, but that he wanted a home, a family and family life, and declared it was against his personal wishes that he sought the divorce. He added he had never been a "squawker," and would not be now.

When they married, he said, it was agreed Estelle would continue acting as long as he actively engaged in fighting. When he quit the ring she was to quit the films. He said Estelle refused to do this and that for the last two years they had practically been apart.

The divorce complaint, he intimated, probably would charge incompatibility. He said there would be no sensational charges and no bitterness on his part.

Estelle regarded married life with him as a hindrance to her ambitions as an opera singer, Dempsey related.
