Washington, N. C.—The body of Charlie Harris of Leechville, torn to pieces by his own hogs, was found on his farm by his daughter, according to word reaching here.

The daughter, Mrs. Nevers Simmons, passing in her car, saw the hogs gathered in the center of the pen some distance from the road, and thinking her father must be feeding them, blew her horn. Receiving no response, she walked to the pen to find the animals tearing at the body.

Those familiar with the habits of the animals expressed the opinion that Harris suffered a fainting spell or a heart attack before being attacked by the hogs, since they never have been known to attack an active man.
