### Won't Move Into 'Best Poor House'

Omaha, Neb.—Three old women—charges of the county—sat in an old and deserted building here, rocking back and forth in their chairs as they steadfastly refused to move into Douglas county's new \$750,000 poor house, described by officials as the "best in the country."

All of the other inmates of the poor farm were transferred to the new building twelve miles outside the city and were comfortably housed in their new home. Pleas of attendants to the three old women, however, fell on deaf ears.

"People out there wouldn't be as nice to us as the neighbors here," said one of them.

### Cost \$250 To Call A Man A "Skunk"

Memphis, Tenn., April 22.—E. G. Herman, of Hemingford, Nebraska, was under court instructions today to pay \$250 to G. W. Glass, of Memphis, for calling Glass a "skunk."

Herman, according to the court record, also wrote Glass that "you are a member of the American order of polecats and the government ought to pay a bounty for such scalps."

Herman testified that he was justified in his statements because his shipments of potatoes to Glass had been rejected.

### No New Experience For Spanish Folks

It is no new experience for Spain to try to govern herself. She tried it once before in 1868 and failed, being forced to call back Isabella the Second, the grand old Bourbon and grandmother of the abdicated Alfonso of this hour. We are reminded of this by Roger B. Merriman, professor of history at Harvard university and an authority on what has always happened to Spain.

The present situation bears striking contrast to the one in September, 1868, when Isabella fled across the Pyrenees to Biarritz with these parting words: "I thought I had struck deeper root in this land." Seven years later the House of Bourbon was called back to salvage what was left. During two of those years Spain was a republic. Governing herself proved a bit more difficult than she imagined.

Harvard's Professor Merriman believes that Spain would recall the Bourbons again if any of Alfonso's six children showed deeper signs of intelligence and a more apparent desire to be strong and popular rulers. Spain is not after Alfonso's neck; it's the years to come she fears. All historians hesitate to prophesy a future for the little mountain-bound nation in Europe's southern corner.

The recall of the Bourbons once before coupled with the democratic attitude of Alfonso and the fact that 45 per cent of the nation's population cannot read or write and voting is compulsory for all males over 25—one wonders if Spain is ready to govern herself, though no other nation wishes her such success in any direction as does America.

### Ministers Oppose S. C. Horse Racing

Rock Hill, S. C.—A resolution deploring the action of the South Carolina house of representatives in passing to the senate a bill providing for pari-mutuel betting in connection with horse racing in this state, and commending the York

county delegation for its united stand against the bill in the house, was adopted by the Rock Hill ministerial association yesterday.

The resolution, signed by Rev. A. E. Holler, as chairman of the association, and Rev. James A. Barrett, secretary, will be forwarded to Senator Walter M. Dunlap, at Columbia, it was said.
