Wilmington Adapots Daylight Saving Time

Wilmington, May 8.—The city council today approved a plan for daylight saving time here and telegraphed the county delegation in the general assembly to introduce a local bill making this effective.

This action was taken after delegations with a petition bearing 1,200 signatures had appeared to urge the step.

Daylight savings time here is widely favored by railroad employes and others in industrial pursuits. Business men have endorsed the idea on the ground that it will allow more time for recreation.

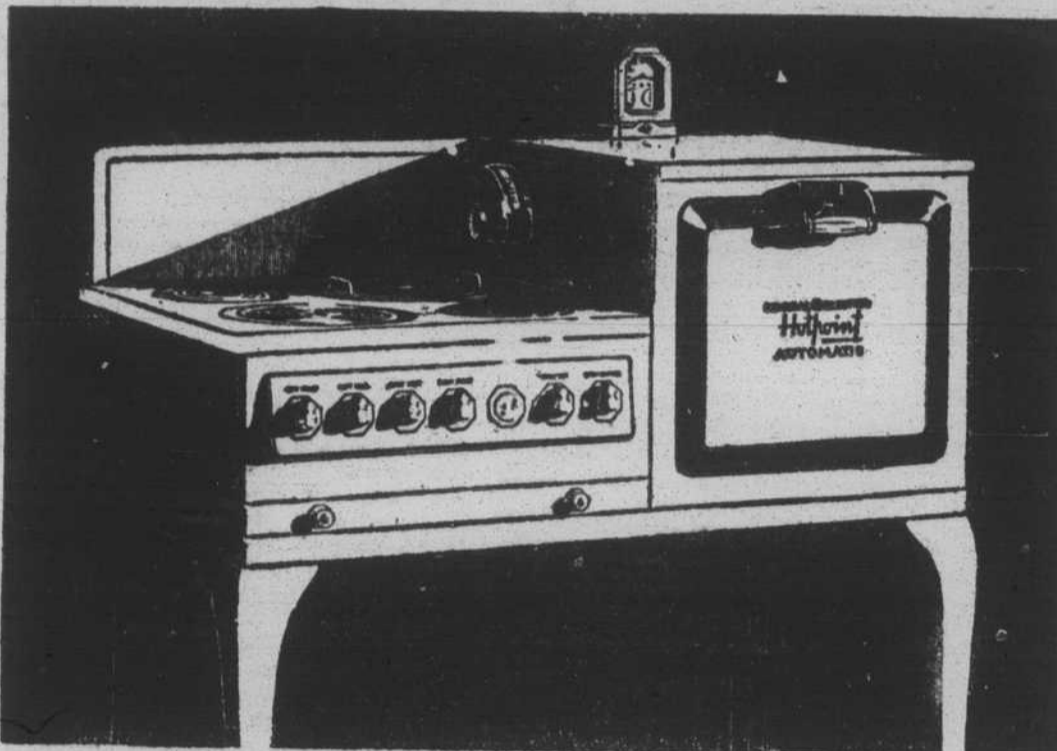

Seven Millions Paid To Veterans

Virtually That Amount Distributed By Charlotte Bureau In April

Charlotte, May 8.—During the month of April the regional offices of the United States Veterans' Bureau here distributed \$6,818,720.87 to North Carolina veterans of the World War, which was nearly \$1,000,000 more than was distributed during the month of March. April will prove the crest in the high tide of loans to veterans under the 50 per cent loan law that made adjusted compensation available to veterans up to as much as half of the total value of their individual compensation certificates. Of the total disbursement \$6,412,236.46 was for these loans.

During April a total of \$27,795 checks were written and mailed from the regional offices of the Veterans' Bureau here for all purposes. This was approximately 1,000 checks for each working day. There were a total of 18,005 individual loans under the 50 per cent loan act distributing the \$6,412,236.46. The remainder of the disbursements, amounting to approximately \$4,000,000, went for miscellaneous expenses and to the payment of the regular disability and compensation allowance cases to which stipulated payments are made each month. There are a total of 5,765 of these cases carried by the bureau here.

Prospects Not Good For Eastern Farmers
