Raleigh—State's prison had a  
population of 2,609 April 30, the larg-  
est in the history of the institution,  
it is announced.

During April the population in-  
creased 56, bringing the net increase  
since January 1 to 283.

There were 154 persons received  
in the prison in April, 119 from  
courts and 19 returned escapees be-  
ing included. Courts sent 61 white  
and 58 colored persons to the prison.  
Ninety-eight persons left the prison,  
including 86 who completed senten-  
ces, 15 escapes and seven paroled  
prisoners.

### Great Violin Master Dies In Brussels

Brussels, May 12.—Eugene Ysaie,  
who broke most of the traditions of  
the violin to become one of the  
world's great masters of that instru-  
ment, died at 4:30 a. m. today after  
a long and wearing illness. He  
would have been 73 years old July  
16.

Death came two months after one  
of the greatest triumphs of his car-  
eer as a musician, the debut of  
his opera, "Peter the Miner," writ-  
ten in Walloon dialect, at Liege, last  
March. He himself was unable to at-  
tend but Queen Elizabeth, who did  
go, arranged a radio broadcast so  
that he could hear the opera from  
his bed.
