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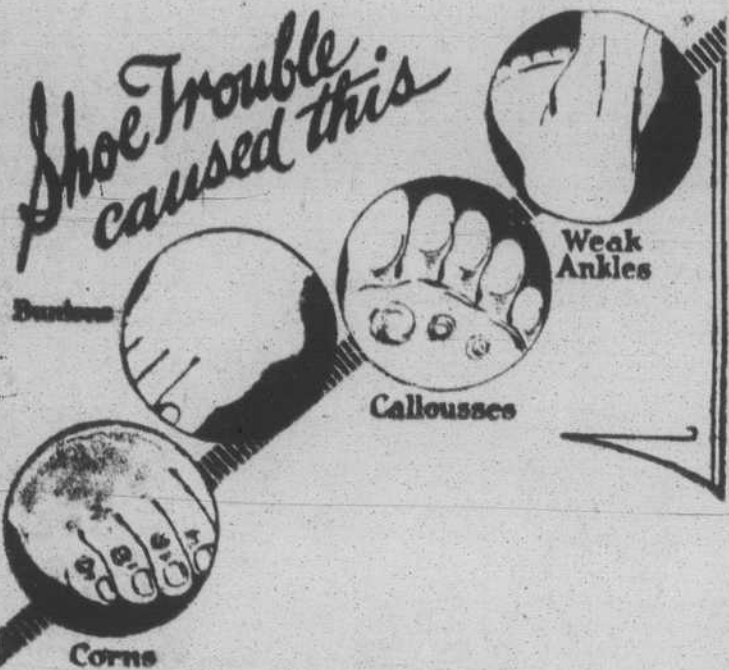

Would Place Race Track Near Tryon.
Raleigh, May 13.—Seeking to legalize horse racing with pari-mutuel betting, Senator McLean, of Polk county introduced a bill in the senate Monday night to establish a racing commission in Polk county. The track would be located near Tryon.
The measure was introduced after a motion had been made to adjourn. Senator McLean failed in an effort to have the measure placed on the calendar and it was referred to a judiciary committee.
An attempt earlier in the session to legalize horse and dog racing and pari-mutuel betting in Buncombe county was approved by the house and killed in the senate.

Road Head Makes \$100,000 Purchase.
