

New Fire Truck At Kings Mount.

Fire Fighting Apparatus Bought Following Fires. School Finals Near.

King Mountain, May 20.—The new American La France fire truck which was ordered by the Kings Mountain city council at their April meeting was delivered Tuesday and will be tested out within the next few days. The new truck is one of the latest models and is equipped with a 600 gallon per minute pump. The company from which it was purchased will send an engineer here within the next few days to instruct the driver and demonstrate the fine points of the machine.

It is the plans of the city fathers to employ one man regular as driver of the truck and chief fireman and in addition there will be a number of volunteer firemen. Falmer Fulton, a local man, has been given the regular job. It was pointed out by the city officials that the new equipment and the employment of an all-time man as driver would place the insurance rate in Kings Mountain to a lower base.

The new truck was bought to replace the old model T Ford which was rigged up for a fire truck and which has most certainly seen its best days. The old truck was driven by the policemen and the volunteer firemen.

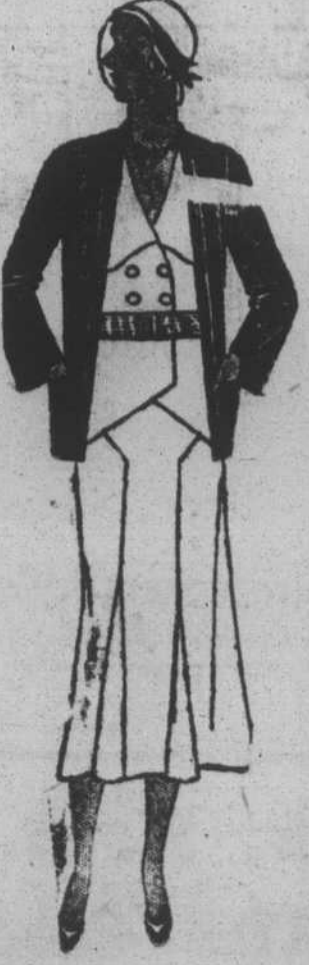

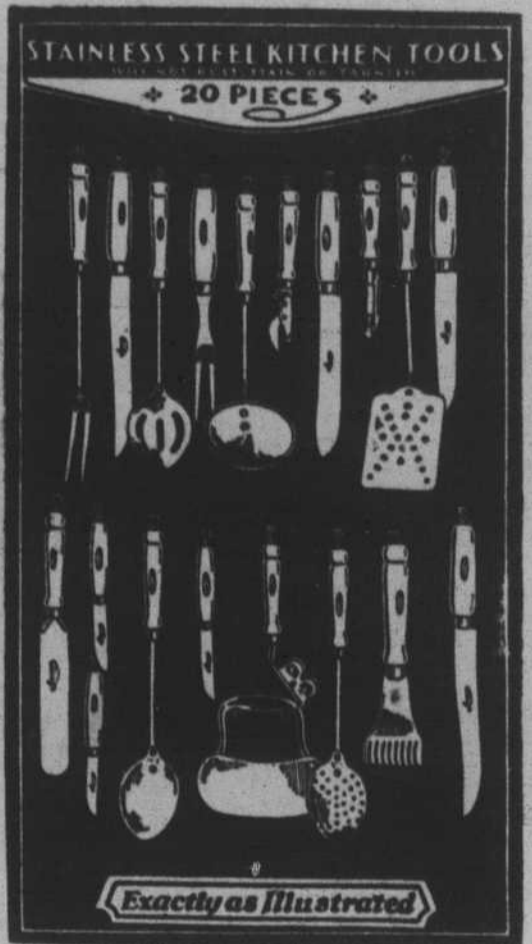
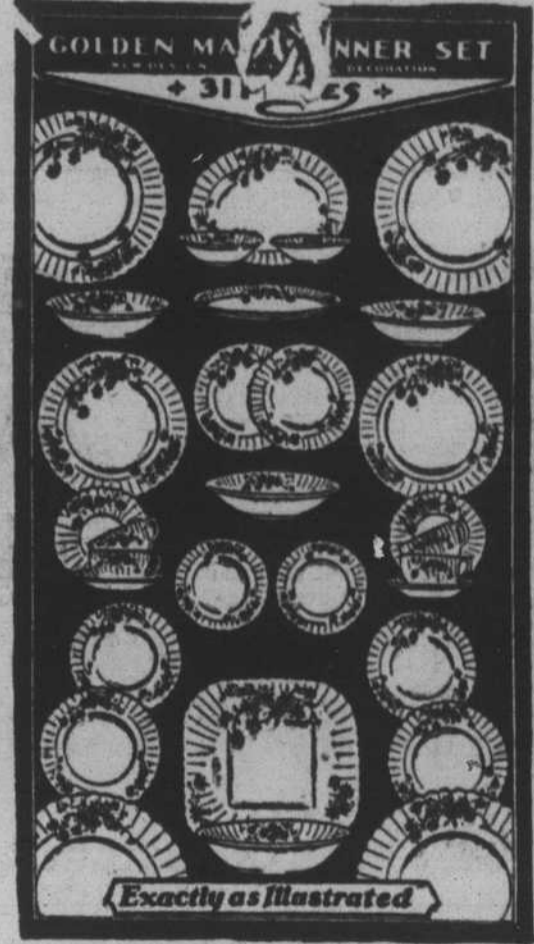
