**May Move Offices Of Commission To Piedmont Section**

Industrial Commission May Go To Charlotte. Nearer Work There.

(Special to The Star.)  
Raleigh, June 5.—The North Carolina Industrial Commission may move its office from Raleigh to some city in the piedmont industrial section of the state, as a result of the amendment to the workmen's Compensation act which permits such a move, and Charlotte is looked upon as the most likely place.  
No decision has yet been reached, but the advisability of moving to a point central to the great industries of the state, largely in the piedmont area, is being discussed and it is likely that some action will be taken and the move, if decided upon will probably be made July 1, at the beginning of the fiscal year.  
Probably more than half of the cases handled are in the piedmont area, with a large percentage of the remaining cases in the mountain region. The move would eliminate

much travel cost and save time to the employers and to the state. Only a few cases develop east of Raleigh and occasional hurried trips of the commissioners to that area would be sufficient.  
In addition to Charlotte, other cities mentioned are Winston-Salem, High Point, Greensboro and Salisbury, but the sentiment appears that Charlotte is the logical point. Chambers of commerce of these and other piedmont cities are getting busy in efforts to land the commission, with its 30 or more employees and officers. The force would make a nice payroll addition, as well as valuable to the hotels and to the legal and medical professions.
