Rules And Regulations Of New Western Carolina League Given

Hickory Record. Emphasizing the importance of every team abiding strictly by the constitution, the new Western Carolina baseball league Monday night adopted a set of rules and regulations covering all problems of major importance which are expected to confront the member teams during the season. The board of directors, composed of two representatives from each club, will be the governing body of the loop, holding meetings on the first and third Monday evenings of each month in Hickory.

The complete text of the rules and regulations follows:
1. That the name of the league shall be the Western Carolina League.
2. That the principal officers shall be a president and secretary-treasurer. That Dick Gurley shall be the president and the Sports Editor of the Daily Record secretary-treasurer.

(a) That the board of directors shall be composed of two representatives from each team, that each team shall have one vote and that in case of a tie the president shall cast the deciding ballot. That the following representatives shall be members of the board of directors: D. L. Howard and M. A. Bolick, Brookfield; Sam Rowe and Joe Erbesfield, Newton; Ralph Bowman and Fred Murphy, Hickory Chair; H. V. Overcash and Clarkson Jones, Rhodhiss; Webb Murray and W. Fred Williams, Cross Mill of Marion; B. T. Gladden and J. M. Hornsby, Cleveland Cloth mill of Shelby.

3. That in case a game is rained out or postponed for any reason, the two teams may arrange when and where to play the game (out of schedule), with the result counting on the league standing; and that the visiting team, provided it makes the trip, shall receive half game receipts of the play-off game.
4. That board meeting be held regularly on the first and third Monday evenings of each month in Hickory, at which time all league questions and disputes will be settled.

5. That each team be limited to 20 players for the first three games and sixteen players after the third scheduled game; and that a list of eligible players must be approved by the league officers and kept on file.
6. That if evidence is presented to the directors, and found valid, charging any team with "leading up" or contriving in any way to win a game by unfair means, the result of the game will be reversed by the directors.
7. That ground rules for individual parks be settled by the managers of the two contesting teams

8. That only D. & M. Spaulding or Wilson baseballs be used in all official games.
9. That in case a team fails to appear on the field for a game, the game shall be scored 9 to 0 in favor of the team that does appear and a forfeit of \$15 be paid by the losing team. If suitable excuse for the non-appearance of the team can be presented at the following board meeting the money forfeit may be lifted.
10. Each team shall provide one umpire for each game and the two umpires shall call the game interchangeably. Each club shall pay its own umpire and the list of umpires shall be approved by the board of directors at its first meeting. If an umpire proves unsatisfactory, a protest may be made to the board of directors.
11. That each team shall post an entrance fee of \$25 which shall be used as a forfeit in case the team drops out of the league before the end of the first half of the schedule. The funds thus provided shall be used for the incidental expenses of the league officials and any remaining sum at the end of the schedule shall be divided equally among the teams in the league at that time.
12. That the schedule shall start on June 1 and end on August 15. The schedule shall be composed of 10 games for the first half and 10 games for the second half, the league game on the fourth of July to be played in the morning.
13. That the winner of each half of the schedule play a five game series within two weeks after the end of the schedule for the league championship.
14. That this set of rules and regulations be adopted in full for the second half of the schedule.

Collegians In New Ball Loop; Gurley Playing

This newly organized Western Carolina semi-pro league, in which Shelby is represented by the Cleveland Cloth mill club, promises to give this section some interesting baseball this summer.

Nearly every club in the baby loop has several college stars or former leaguers well known to fans of this area.

Dick Gurley, Lenoir-Rhyne coach, is catching for Rhodhiss. In the Rhodhiss victory over Hickory last week Gurley slammed out a double and a triple in three trips up. Another collegian in the Rhodhiss lineup was Benny Troutman, Lenoir-Rhyne star.

George Bailey, Davidson college hurler, is one of the mound aces of the Hickory club. Other players known to fans hereabouts are Kiser and Clemmer of The Hickory club Jimmy Mullins, Hickory high star, of the Brookfield club, Hager, Lefler and Broome of the Newton club and the Murrays of the Marion outfit.
