### State To Pay Out Over Five Million; Bonds And Interest

State's Annual Interest Bill Over Seven Millions. To Reduce Bond Debt.  
 (Special to The Star.)  
 Raleigh, June 16.—The state of North Carolina will pay out \$5,443,195 as of July 1, of which \$2,112,800 will go toward reducing the state's bonded indebtedness and \$3,330,395 will go to pay the usual semi-annual interest on outstanding bonds of the state. State Treasurer Nathan O'Berry stated today.  
 The state's annual interest bill on its present outstanding bonds is approximately \$7,250,000, the bulk of which is paid as of January 1 and July 1. A few of the bonds are due in April and October, about half a million dollars at each time. The bond reduction fund includes

the retirement of \$1,012,600 in highway bonds falling due, which comes from the special highway fund, and \$100,000 in bonds for permanent improvements at the state's institutions, and \$1,000,000 in general fund note bonds, which comes from the general fund.  
 The interest to be paid includes \$2,451,122.50 on the outstanding highway bonds, which comes from the highway fund; \$528,310 on miscellaneous state bonds, which comes from the general fund, and \$351,162.50 on bonds sold to aid the counties and local districts in erecting school houses, which comes from the units which borrowed this money. Treasurer O'Berry states.  
 In addition to this nearly five and a half million dollars in interest and bond retirement, the state treasurer will have to pay the bulk of the approximately \$5,000,000 in pensions to Confederate veterans and widows, during the next week or two, warrants for which are to be sent out June 15, the semi-annual advance payment.

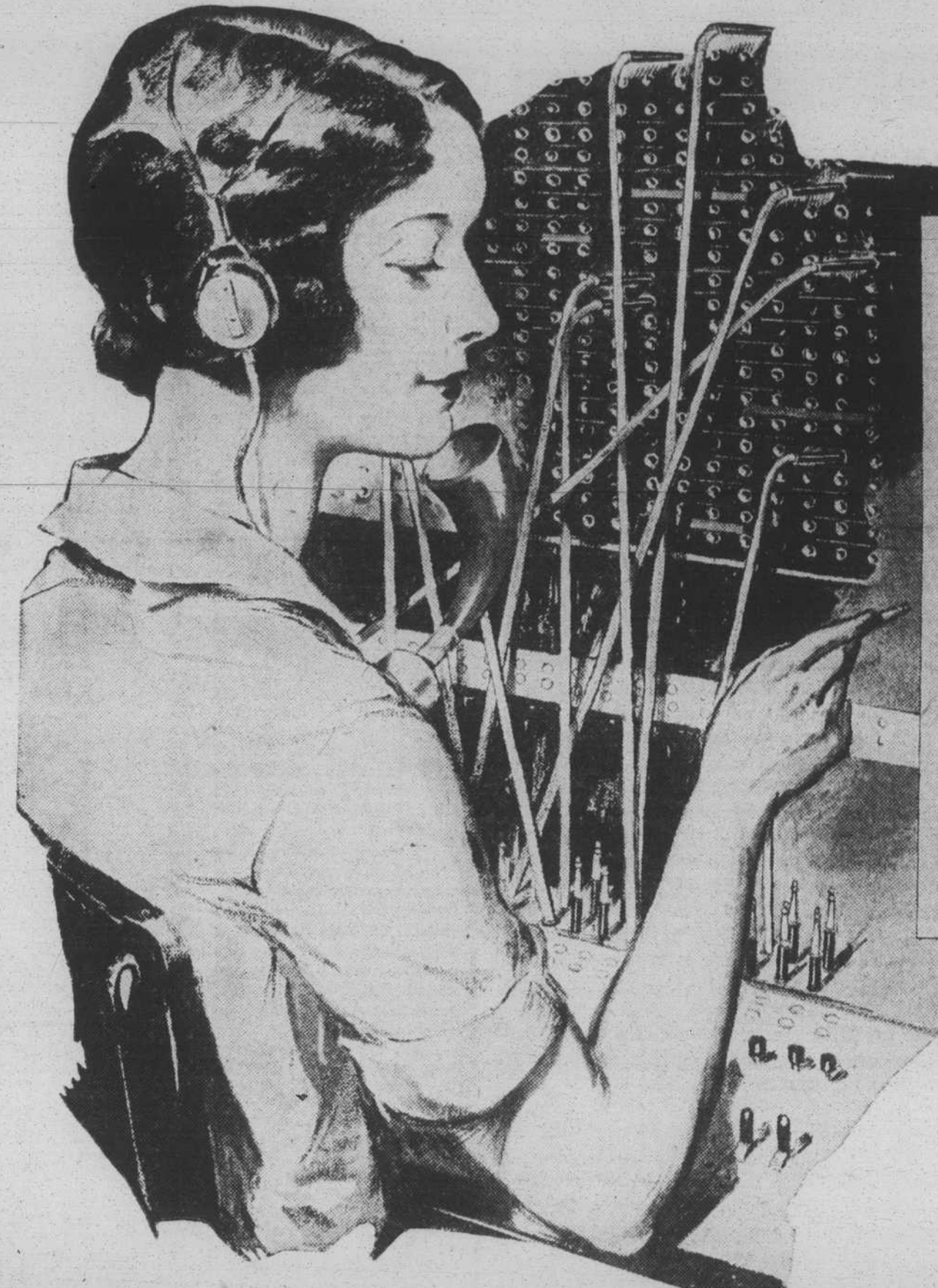
