But when they ask me to supply each want, from soup to shingle-bob, I really must confess that I feel hardly equal to the job. If I were not compelled to dig for things their garden should produce, for products of the cow or pig, the hen, the turkey or the goose, then I could help them hoard some dough, and slow but surely get ahead, and all my bounty would not go to pay for horses that are dead."
