## Legion Is Carrying On



There is no organization with higher ideals or stronger purposes than the American Legion. Composed as it is of the patriotic-minded men and women who bore arms in the defense of their flag and country, the legion is today pledged to a program of usefulness and service which commands the deepest respect and the whole-hearted admiration of the American public. The men who marched away to war returned to civilian life with a rekindled love for their native land, appreciating the fact that solemn obligations and responsibilities rested upon them as individual citizens. In furtherance of the objective for which they fought, these men organized the American Legion as the vehicle to put their program into practical operation.

The principles of the legion, its ideals and purposes, are beautifully expressed in the preamble of the legion constitution which is herewith quoted.

"To uphold and defend the constitution of the United States; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a 100 per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the Great War; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to community, state and nation; to combat that autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity, the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness."

These are the ideals and principles which the legion is organized to uphold, and when given definite interpretation through constructive activities for the betterment of the nation, they provide a challenge of the first order to all veterans of the World War. In each and every one of these principles there is a theme for extensive discussion but some of them are worthy of especial mention. As water seeks its common level, so do the thoughts of service first turn towards the preservation of our beloved constitution. It is the sacred document which guarantees to every American his inalienable rights to freedom. It is the solid foundation upon which our republic has grown and prospered and the future security of the nation demands that its covenants remain undespilled and kept inviolate.

The ways and means adopted by the legion to give these principles a practical application is the everyday life of the nation have been many and varied. Realizing that law and order is essential to the maintenance of a government "of the people, by the people and for the people," the legion has sought on every hand to instill a greater love for flag and country. The legion's Americanism program embraces a multiplicity of worth-while activities. Sponsoring Boy Scout troops, conducting a nation-wide junior baseball program for boys, operating citizenship schools for the newly naturalized citizens, urging all citizens to take an active interest in affairs of government, are some of the specific channels through which Americanism has been taught. The legion has given its support and thought to movements designed to bring a better understanding between nations and foster world peace. For every principle enunciated in the preamble of the constitution, the legion is carrying on one or more activities to give that principle practical usefulness and expression.

Dedicated to endeavors of such a worthy character, the American Legion extends to every World War veteran the opportunity to become associated with his comrades in an selfish program of service to the nation and its people. It was an honor to march behind the flag in 1917 and 1918 and it should likewise

race unless demand becomes so insistent that he will virtually be drafted into it.

The friends of Ehringhaus are not at all disturbed at the claims made by Fountain and his followers and maintain that Ehringhaus is gaining steadily at the expense of Fountain merely because he is "sitting tight" until the psychological time comes to open up his campaign. Some two weeks ago in a story written by this correspondent some friends of Fountain were quoted as saying that Fountain would carry every county in eastern North Carolina with the possible exception of Pasquotank, the home county of Ehringhaus.

In an illuminating letter concerning how the people in the northeastern counties feel about Ehringhaus, Herbert Peete, editor of the Elizabeth City Daily Advance, says: "It seems to be that you should have qualified your statement that friends of Fountain are predicting he will carry every county in the east with the exception of Pasquotank with some statement of the viewpoint of friends of Mr. Ehringhaus. Friends of Mr. Ehringhaus, I am sure, regard any such claim as absurd. So far as my contracts go, I have found no strength for Fountain anywhere in this section. In this section I meet men in all walks of life and I have yet to find a single voter who says he will vote for Mr. Fountain or a single voter who says he will vote against Ehringhaus. It is my frank opinion that the statement that Mr. Ehringhaus is not popular in his own section of the state does him a grave injustice. In my opinion, he is just as popular in any of the counties where he served as solicitor as he is in Pasquotank. His popularity in these counties rests on the fact that he is known."

In discussing Mr. Ehringhaus and his attitude toward the luxury tax, the McLean law, Mr. Peete says: "While it is true that Mr. Ehringhaus did not come out for the luxury tax when asked for his position on the McLean law by the News and Observer he did express the hope that the legislature would find a way to effectuate the MacLean law to support the six months schools without recourse to ad valorem taxes."

He does own a farm, same city and suburban real estate. Aside from that his investments are in local enterprises. There is every reason why he should be able to see the tax problem from the standpoint of the state as any man now in public life. Where he is known his personal popularity is so tremendous that his friends are confident it will sweep all substantial opposition before it."

## Japan Has Army Of 231,600 Men

Tokio, June 16.—The Japanese war office has published figures on the nation's military strength which will be submitted to the League of Nations in connection with the 1932 disarmament conference.

These figures showed that the army numbered 231,600 men, including officers, in addition to 2,210 men in the gendarmerie and about 20,000 police in Korea, Formosa and Manchuria.

The aviation branch totaled 623 airplanes and eight regiments, but it was intimated that these figures would be increased, bearing out press reports that the organization of two new air regiments was contemplated.
