Senate Race Will Interesting Affair

Lenoir News-Topic.—After Mr. Clyde R. Hoey made his recent statement in Charlotte anent the race for the United States Senate it is rather generally believed that he will announce his candidacy around the first of the year. And some days ago Judge Tam Bowie assured the state that "somebody" must oppose Senator Morrison, which leads to the opinion that Judge Tam is thinking of himself as the most logical somebody. So it seems a fairly safe surmise

that both Mr. Hoey and Mr. Bowie will take on the Senator in the next June primary, and that leaves much room for speculation. In all the western part of the state we do not believe there are two men capable of running a stronger race than Mr. Morrison and Mr. Hoey. They are veteran campaigners, both having tremendously large personal followings throughout the state and both being able to move the masses to great enthusiasm. Any other candidates who seek the nomination must base their hope upon the nullifying effect that the candidacies of these two men will have on each other. Both

of them are friendly to the large dry sympathizers of the state, and both of them are friendly to the corporate interests. They could not do otherwise than run campaigns similar in doctrine and preaching, and that would lead to the belief that they will make the candidacy of a strong third man endowed with some measure of hope. Whether that candidate is to be Judge Bowie remains to be seen. Rumor is leaking from down the mountain that Robert R. Reynolds of Asheville is seriously considering entering the race. A man who got more than 90,000 votes in a race against the beloved Senator Overman five years ago is not to be discounted. And there, of course, is Mr. Crist, whose strength is a rather indefinite thing at this date. All in all, it has prospects of being an intensely interesting campaign before it is over.

Saturday Bath Is Necessary, Court Rules In Hearing

Chicago.—The inalienable right of every American citizen to a Saturday night bath has been upheld in court.

The ruling was given by Judge Rudolph Desori in Superior court. It concerned Stanley Norwell, a druggist, against whom the judge issued an injunction to restrain him from taking a bath in the bathroom of the apartment used jointly by him and his estranged wife, Antonette, on all days except Saturdays.

Mrs. Norwell sued for separate maintenance on May 12 and was given the right to occupy, rent free, an apartment over her husband's

store. He was allowed one room there as sleeping quarters. "When we lived together," she told the court, "one bath a week was plenty for Stanley. Now he takes one every day. He does it just to annoy me."

The judge refused her plea to keep Stanley out of the bath-room

altogether on the ground that a Saturday bath is a necessity.

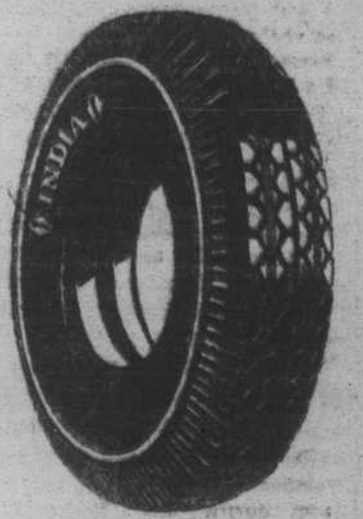
