Banker At Gaffney Gets A Year Term

Former Cherokee Commission Chairman Convicted Of Breach Of Trust.

Gaffney, S. C., July 15.—Convicted on one count of an indictment charging breach of trust with fraudulent intent, T. D. Daniel this afternoon was sentenced by Judge Thomas J. Seas to serve one year. Notice of appeal was given and Daniel was released under \$500 bond.

Daniel, former chairman of the Cherokee county sinking fund commission and former cashier of the now defunct American State bank, was found guilty of converting to his own use \$1,000 from city of Gaffney sinking funds being handled by the
