Wars and Revolutions Occur with Less Frequency and Are Over Before Mister Adventurer Can Join the Fracas

With the nations of the earth turning from Mars disillusioned, that hardy breed, the soldiers of fortune, find themselves at a very loose end. And it is not alone the desire for peace that irks these colorful trouble-hunters.

Progress also has done its share to make life uninteresting for the men whose very existence is fighting and adventure. Planes and radio have taken a lot of the romance out of surprise revolutions. No more can men like Lee Christmas stride through South American jungles setting up or unseating governments just for the fun of it.

And to make things worse, the attitude of the U. S. in refusing to recognize governments set up by coup d'etat has had a pronounced effect in discouraging revolutions. Perhaps the most colorful soldier of fortune alive today is Rafael de Nogales, who fought in revolts from Mexico to Brazil and rose to be a division commander in the Turkish Army. Another name that comes readily to mind is that of Bert Hall, an American now with General Chan's army in China. Then there is Alfred Batson, American author, who stirred things up in South America until the U. S. Marines invited him to leave.

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Improvement In Health Shown Among Cleveland County Folks

Quoting from that gently ditty entitled: Every Cloud Has a Silver Lining—popular before '29, and now out of date.

Dr. E. A. Houser, well known in these parts, points to one particular species of silver lining to the Cleveland County cloud—namely, the increasing good health of the local people.

What with the people being afflicted at and to and about, in the matter of diet—good and proper eating—the health of Cleveland county folks was almost never better.

The well known physician was asked specifically about pellagra, whether the disease is on the increase or decrease in the county. Pellagra is classed as a hard time malady, afflicting the people in a pinch.

Here was his reply. "Pellagra is definitely on the decrease in Cleveland County. There is less and less of it, far less than last years. Notwithstanding times are tight, the people have been so thoroughly instructed in the necessity for proper diet, and have been taught so strictly what proper diet is, that seemingly they have learned the lesson. One of the most valuable lessons, by the way, in all human life."

Dr. Houser went on to say that not only are sufferers being cured of pellagra, and the disease definitely conquered, but the health of the people is generally improved.

As pellagra, he pointed out, is due practically solely to improper diet, an unbalanced ration, so many other lesser ailments also owe their source to the wrong combination of foods. So that the lessons of proper eating being learned, is proving beneficial all around.

"Get folks to eat right," said the doctor, "and it will be found there will be not much the matter with them."
