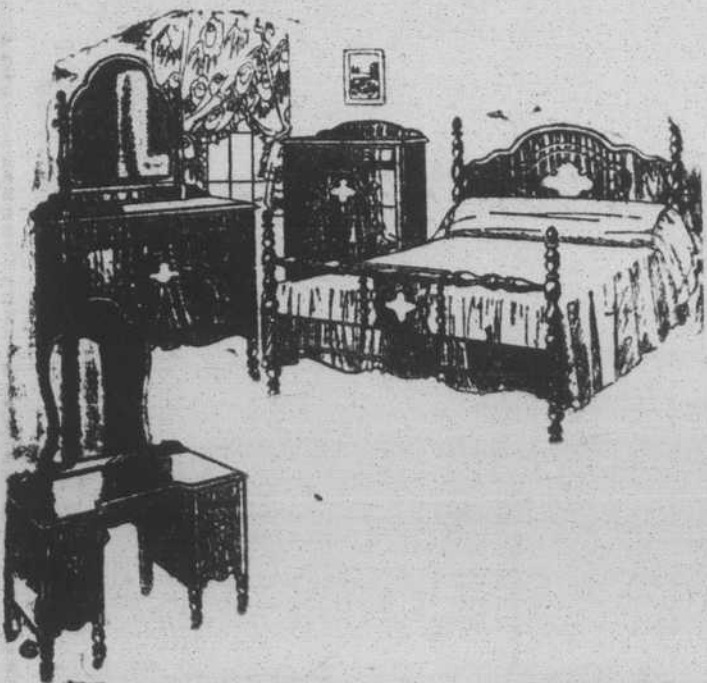

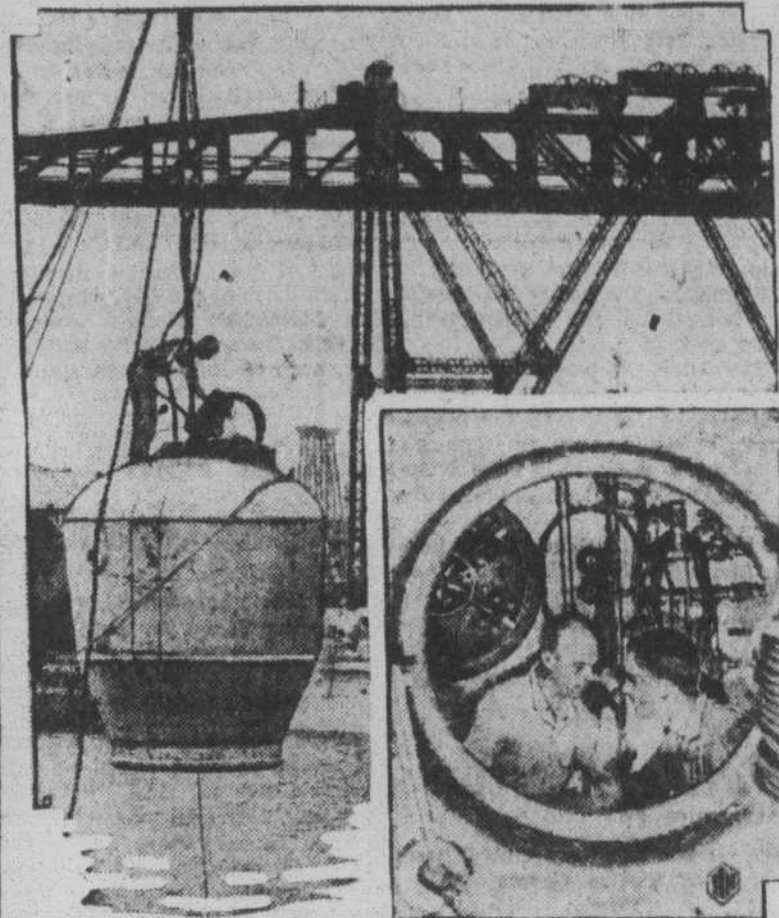

New "Bell" Will Save Lives



Under the watchful eyes of United States Naval officers, the newly invented and perfected submarine diving bell or rescue chamber is shown above being lowered into the water at Brooklyn, N. Y., Navy Yard for a test. As many as eight men at a time can be transferred from a sunken vessel to the chamber, which rises to the surface from its own buoyancy. Lieut. Commander A. P.
