The water supplied to any well-regulated community is regularly inspected and subjected to rigid tests.

White Family Safe

In Darkest Africa

Dr. Anders Shows Collection of Curios and Pictures From West African Wilds.

Ogbomosho is a city of 85,000 black natives in Nigeria, British West Africa and in that entire population of negroes, there are only 16 white people, yet Dr. J. Clarence Anders, medical missionary who is in Shelby visiting James A. Wilson, Hackett Blanton and other relatives says the white people feel perfectly safe and secure among the natives.

Dr. Anders says four of the 16 white people feel perfectly safe and secure among the natives.

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
