Truck War Declared By North Carolina

Raleigh, Aug. 18.—North Carolina declared a virtual "truck war" on Georgia and Kentucky today.

Orders were issued by Captain Charles D. Farmer of the state highway patrol to require all Georgia and Kentucky trucks operating through this state to secure North Carolina licenses, and to institute charges against the drivers for failing to have Tarheel tags.

His action follows complaints to both his offices and the motor vehicle bureau of the state department of revenue by North Carolina truck owners who said they are receiving similar treatment in Georgia and Kentucky.
