Tax Collector Gets \$2,000 Yearly Salary

Rutherford County News. Mr. Henry C. Carson, well known citizen who lives about eight miles east of here in Logan Store township was Monday afternoon elected tax collector of Rutherford county for a term of one year, effective October 1, 1931. He was elected on the eighth ballot by a joint meeting of the county commissioners and the county board of education. He succeeds Mr. M. J. Harrill of Forest City. Mr. Carson's salary will be \$2000 per year with \$1200 additional for a deputy, or office help and \$600 per year for traveling expenses, making a total of \$3,800 that he will have to collect the 1931 taxes of Rutherford county with, according to a law passed by the legislature of 1929.
