Sues Aimee's Mate Rutherford Fair Attracts Crowd For Opening Day



15,000 To 20,000 People On Hand At Opening; Exhibits Reported To Be Better.

Rutherford, Sept. 23.—A crowd estimated at from 15,000 to 20,000 people attended the four-county fair opening at the Rutherford county fair grounds between here and Forest City yesterday.

The fair is reported to be the largest and best in the history of the county. The live-at-home exhibit from Polk county and the Glenwood exhibit from McDowell county, with the name spelled in sweet potatoes, are attracting much attention.

The main exhibit is crowded with booths of farm, school, factory, business firms, canned goods, field crops and fancy work. The livestock and poultry buildings have the best exhibit in the 11 years' history of the fair.

The free acts each afternoon beginning at 2 o'clock and each evening at 7:30 o'clock are the best in the history of the fair and equal the acrobatic stunts of a circus.

Added enthusiasm indicates that the general farm booths and all agricultural and household exhibits will be more comprehensive and better prepared than ever before.
