To Organize P. T. A. Mooresboro School

Supt. J. H. Grigg To Speak On Some Phase of Education On Tuesday, Nov. 10.

On Tuesday evening, November 10, at 7:30 the parents and teachers of Mooresboro school will meet for the purpose of reorganizing the Parent-Teacher association. Last year the association did some very fine work. At the end of the year there were about seventy-five members on roll, with an average attendance of sixty or more.

After the officer for the association are elected, Mr. J. H. Grigg county superintendent of Cleveland county, will address the association on some phase of education. Instead of having a program each day during the next week, which is American Education week, the school is having the address by Mr. Grigg on the night that the Parent-Teacher association meets. All parents and teachers are urged to be present for the meeting and to bear the address.

What Candidate Will Get Votes From Brummitt?

Raleigh, Nov. 6.—What is to become of the following that would have lined up for Attorney General Dennis G. Brummitt, prospective candidate for governor, who announces that he will not be a candidate? Which of the candidates and prospective candidates will be benefitted?

These and related questions have been asked many times in the last two days, and will be asked many more. It is to be admitted that the Brummitt following, prospective following, is a high type of citizenship including leading lawyers, prominent Baptists, many important people in all walks of life, and particularly, the bulk of the teachers in the state. Just how extensive, how imposing it would have been, will, of course, never be known. The important question is where that strength will finally settle.

Generally, it might be said, this strength will disintegrate itself among the three candidates in the field and others who might enter, if any. Many believe the lists are closed, even though it is several months until the primary day. The Brummitt retirement might add hopes of others. Willis Smith, or Josephus Daniels, or Albert L. Cox, or a new one or two, might enter the contest. All of this now seems unlikely.

It might be argued that the Brummitt retirement might add to the possibility of the entry of Mr. Daniels—that Mr. Daniels would get most of his support. Many of the Brummitt supporters, it is stated, are against the special session, which Mr. Daniels is seeking to precipitate. His attitude now, while the state is in a sort of balance, could easily be tipped over by a special session, especially if that session should throw the state into a frenzy over taxation. And that apparently is what Mr. Daniels is seeking.

Many men who hold the Daniels view in many respects, may well ask the question of what Mr. Daniels would do about a special session if he were governor. It is apparent, regardless of the condition of the state, that he would call the extraordinary session, since he is demanding that Governor Gardner call the session. Everything considered, it was probably a very inopportune time for Mr. Daniels for Mr. Brummitt to retire.

Belief is that Mr. Brummitt would have had the bulk of support of the 23,000 school teachers in the state. Some of that, it is said, would go to Mr. Daniels, should he run. But the teachers generally are believed to be in opposition to a special session on one ground; that it might seek further to reduce their salaries, which was limited to 10 per cent by the regular session.

Prediction is that not 1,000 of these 23,000 teachers would vote for A. J. Maxwell, as a result of the tilt he has had, not only with the heads of the state's institutions, but with the individual school men. And it is true that the teachers will be heard from in this campaign. Also, they are sure to be able to account for a block of at least 50,000 votes. Some of them might go to R. T. Fountain. Many of them, it seems certain, will go to J. C. B. Ehringhaus.

There is and has been a fairly close alignment between Mr. Brummitt and Mr. Maxwell. Earlier in the campaign there was even intimation that there might be an understanding arrived at between them, as to which would become a candidate. No credence was or is given to this by those who know both men, and it is certain that both would deny it. However, the Brummitt school folk strength will go anywhere else but to Mr. Maxwell, although he might receive some of the other Brummitt following.

Some even say now that Mr. Maxwell will retire from the race before the primary, and that the fight will be between Ehringhaus and Fountain. However, those who followed Mr. Maxwell during the period while he was considering entering, and recall the deliberation and the consideration he gave before he said anything, can hardly see that result. They believe he is in the running to the end, unless, perchance, he himself should conclude in due time that he had no chance of election.

Mr. Brummitt's retirement, while referred to as unexpected and startling, has been predicted in some quarters for months. However it is of sufficient moment to cause extensive speculation and has brought for a short period, at least the gubernatorial race out of its obscurity into the limelight.
