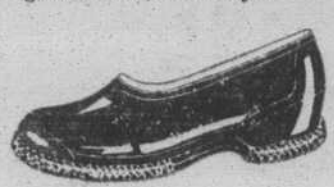

## Rutherford County Home Head Renamed

Rutherford, Nov. 5.—C. S. Royster was yesterday re-elected superintendent of the Rutherford county home for two years at a salary of \$100 a month. The office formerly paid \$125 a month. Last January the salary was cut 10 percent, or to \$112.50. Beginning next January 1, the salary will be \$100 per month. The county furnishes food and a home for the keeper, but he must supply clothing and incidental expenses for his family. The Roysters took charge of the county home in 1921.

## Duke Board Gives Hospitals \$718,472

The sum of \$376,000 is appropriated for New Hospital Buildings.

Hospitals in the two Carolinas received \$718,472 during 1930 from the Duke endowment for services they rendered free patients, according to the sixth annual report of the endowment's hospital division, just completed. The report also revealed that the sum of \$376,000 was appropriated during the same period for 11 new hospital projects.

Dr. W. S. Rankin, director of the hospital division, made the report. These contributions bring the amount of appropriations to completed projects up to \$1,621,527. During the past six years hospitals in the Carolinas have received \$2,829,218.95 on the basis of a dollar a day for each day of free service rendered.
