New York, Nov. 18.—Good business in spots, mid 498 against 429 yesterday, sterling in London 377 1/2 against 378 here when Liverpool closed. It is estimated in Memphis that they have already swapped half a million bales futures for spots and that they are continuing the plan without regard to basis or any other consideration. ### Million Dollar Plant Offer Being Studied

and has been the policy of the S. P. U. company to finance itself which it can do more economically.

**Officials Non Committal.**

No member of the city board uttered a word that would indicate whether they are for or against the sale of the city's plant. They are considering the matter deliberately and soberly, going into the matter of rates, taxes, bond retirement, plant worth and earnings, etc., before issuing any statement to the public.

The city's system of bookkeeping does not reveal the physical value of the plant or how much the city has invested. During the past two years, the audit reveals a profit of approximately \$50,000 profit on a receipt and disbursement basis. A careful investigation will be made by the city to determine whether the earnings revealed by the audit are correct or approximate.

The city's light plant was purchased from McMillan Brothers and others about 13 years ago for the sum of \$13,000. Since then the city has had remarkable growth and considerable money has been put back into the plant.

**Value Enhancement.**

The matter of a sale is the subject of conversation on the streets. Some favor a sale, but the picture seems to be opposed to a sale at the price offered, feeling that if the plant has advanced in value from \$13,000 eighteen years ago to \$1,100,000 now and is the city's chief asset and source of revenue, its value will continue upward in the future. Others who favor a sale want a counter proposition made to the S. P. U. at a price considerable in advance of that offered, before it is submitted to a vote. Those who favor a sale are anxious to see the city's bonded indebtedness retired. This bond indebtedness is \$1,102,900 according to the last audit.

No further meeting of the board is scheduled to consider the matter except the next monthly meeting the first Tuesday night in December.

### Corporation Group, Former Examiner Is To Face Indictment

True Bills Returned In Buncombe County Against Mitchell And Commission.

Asheville, Nov. 18.—True bills charging John Mitchell, former state bank examiner, and members of the state corporation commission, with violating the state banking laws in connection with the closing of the Central and Biltmore-Oteen banks, have been found by the Buncombe county grand jury, J. Arthur Penland, foreman, announced last night.

The true bills will be presented today to Judge Cameron F. McRae, presiding over the November term of superior court. The bills, Mr. Penland said, contain three counts each against the four defendants. Two counts involve allowing the Central Bank to remain open after insolvency and the third count charges the same violation in connection with the Biltmore-Oteen bank.

W. T. Lee, of Waynesville, chairman, and Commissioners Stanley Wobegone and George P. Pell are the other three defendants said by Mr. Penland to be named in the true bill.

The bills were found yesterday afternoon after the grand jury had questioned four witnesses during a three hour session. G. N. Heron, liquidating agent of the two closed banks; the Rev. George Floyd Rogers, rector of Trinity Episcopal church; D. M. Darden, state bank examiner and W. F. Gourcay, special investigator who prepared audits of the two banks.

Stack the grand jury said it was convinced that the corporation commission had disregarded the law in their supervision of at least two banks in North Carolina, the Central and the Biltmore-Oteen bank.
