All six men have performed brilliantly and gallantly during three years of competition at Carolina, and Virginia has never pulled down Carolina's victory banner while these six were in the lineup. They will be set to keep the record clean when they run their last game in beautiful Kenan Stadium Thursday, and they will also be out to run their best games individually, for every man of the six is a strong contender for All State, and Fysal

is a leading contender for all Southern honors. Rip Slusser, one of the number, who is leading Carolina's scorers, and who will lead Carolina's running attack, is a Virginian, hailing from Blacksburg. John Phipps, hard running sophomore, who led the ground-gainers in the Duke game, is the only other Virginian on the first two teams at Carolina.

Mrs. Wortman Heads Better Homes Club

Mrs. Charles A. Wortman has been appointed again as chairman of the better homes committee for Casar. This is the eleventh nation-wide campaign of better homes in America, an education organization established for public service in the interest of home improvement. President Hoover is honorary chairman of the organization and Secretary Wilbur is president. The headquarters office is in Washington, D. C. with Dr. James Ford in charge as executive director.

The better homes campaign is designed to stimulate the improvement of housing conditions and bring about a more wholesome type of home and family life. The programs carried out by local committees are determined by the needs and conditions in the community. Features include lectures and discussions, exhibits, contests, and where possible the demonstration of one or more new or remodeled houses to show how the better types of homes can be provided for families of modest incomes at a cost within their reach.

When a large section of the negro district of Columbia, Tyrrell county, was burned on October 17, the colored people lost all of their clothing as well as their homes and furniture. With cold weather coming, it was apparent that something had to be done at once, so working with the welfare department, Miss Georgia Piland, home agent, secured donations of clothing and odds and ends of cloth which might be used by the destitute for covering this winter. Miss Piland then met with the negro women and organized a sewing class of 15 to make new garments and work over the material which had been donated from various sources. Two sewing machines were carried to the local school building and Miss Piland gave enough of her time to direct the making of the garments.

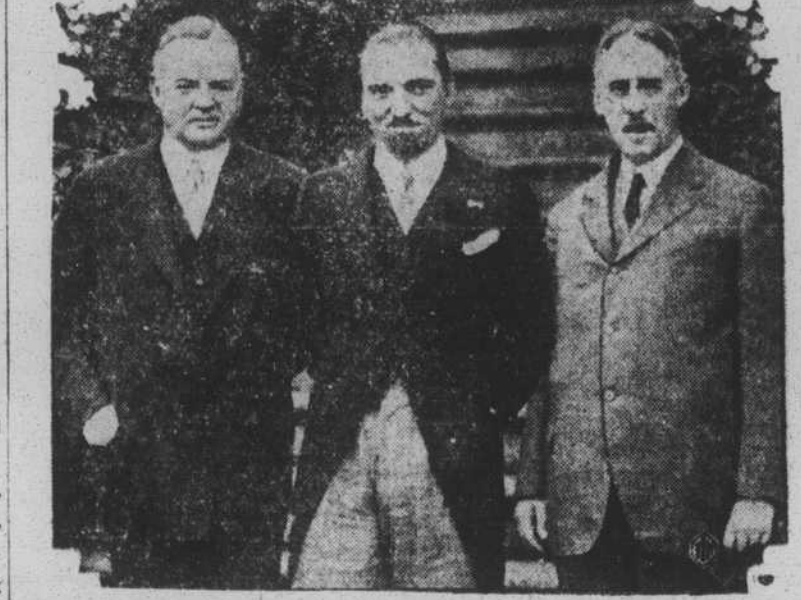

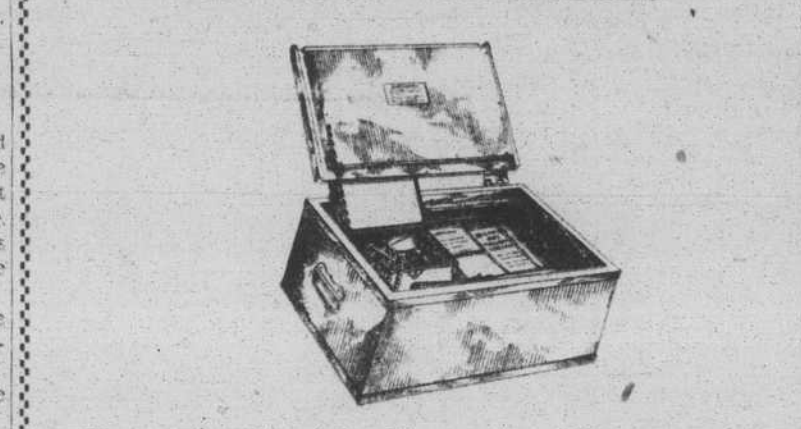
