

Walsh Predicts Roosevelt Will Get Presidency

Norfolk, Va.—Senator Thomas J. Walsh, Democrat of Montana in an interview here said he expected Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, to be the next Democratic nominee for president. He added that he believed Roosevelt would be overwhelmingly elected.

"Roosevelt will undoubtedly be the Democratic nominee, in my opinion," Senator Walsh said. "No one else is even thought of in my section of the country."

"And who will the Republicans run," he was asked.

"Hoover, of course."

"What about the main issues before the next session of congress."

"Revenue and unemployment relief."

Stack May Probe Claim Of Bought Jurors This Week

Judge A. M. Stack May Order Further Probe Into Wickes Wamboldt's Statement.

Asheville, Nov. 30.—Wickes Wamboldt's charges that Buncombe county jurors have been "bought and sold like sacks of corn" may be further investigated when Judge A. M. Stack, of Monroe, convenes superior court here today.

The Asheville Times says it learns that Judge Stack is certain to take cognizance of the recent charges of the blind city councilman.

Wamboldt declared in a public address recently that if immunity from prosecution and punishment "is obtained from such witnesses as I may present, I am assured that former jurors will be produced from Buncombe and surrounding counties to testify under oath that they were bought by lawyers."

The Times says that in the event judicial notice is taken of Wamboldt's allegations, two courses are open to Judge Stack.

1. He can issue special instructions to the grand jury to make an investigation.

2. He can sit as a committing magistrate, fix a date for a public hearing and call witnesses alleged to know about the charges.

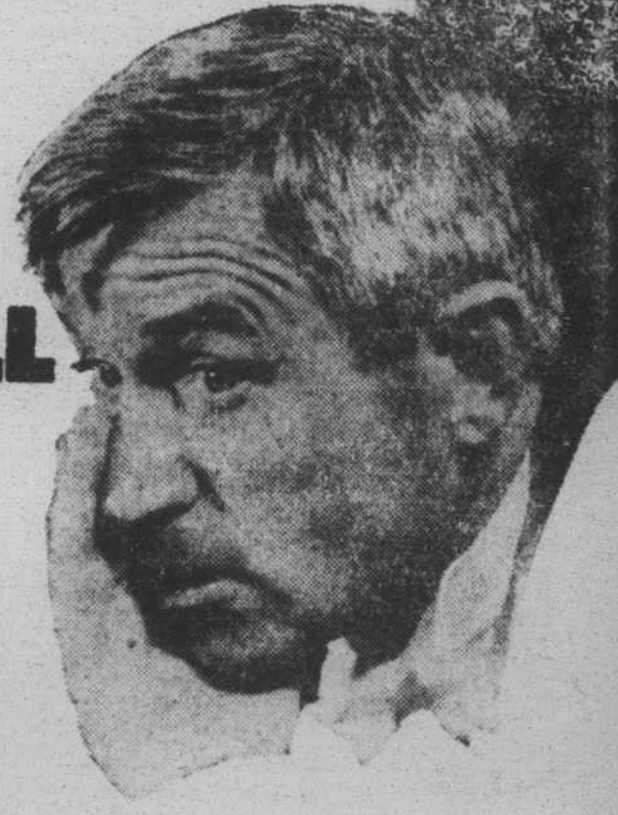
