

Daniels Entry Would Bring On Bitter Campaign

Race For Governor Could Be The "Meanest" Political Battle In Many Years.

Raleigh, Nov. 28.—Political waters calm and serene for some months, except for occasional ripples and the big splash when Pitt county men asked Josephus Daniels to run for Governor and his reply calling for more time and reinforcements.

R. T. Fountain has made a few public appearances recently, continuing his attacks on some of the Democratic achievements and warning against some that are considered possible objects in the future.

Mr. Daniels told Pitt county supporters that his inclination was to remain in the editor's chair, but would give ear to their call.

If they will show him his duty, he will do it, Mr. Daniels said, leaving himself free to run or not to run.

"If they made him mad enough, he will run," one close to Mr. Daniels is quoted as saying weeks ago.

Hope To Complete New Prison Camps In Next 60 Days

One Of Four 100-Man Camps Being Erected At Shelby, Modern System.

Raleigh, Dec. 28.—Five of the eleven new prison camps being built by the state highway commission will probably be completed within the next 30 days, while the remainder will be ready in about 60 days.

The eleven camps now under construction are being built entirely by the highway commission, since it was unable to obtain contracts at all near the price at which it could build them, according to Mr. Betts.

The labor used in the construction of these camps however, is almost entirely local labor employed from the immediate communities.

Of the 11 camps under construction, seven are for 75 prisoners each with quarters for superintendent and guards, while four are for 100 prisoners each.

All the new camps are of modern design, with the sleeping quarters of fireproof brick construction, with adequate shower baths and toilet facilities. The prison regulations now require all prisoners to be clean shaven every day, with hair cut regularly.

The seven 75-man camps now under construction are near Warren, Warren county; Hazelwood, Haywood county; Jackson, Northampton county; Siler City, Chatham county; Kenansville, Duplin county; Oxford, Granville county, and Marion, McDowell county.

There is arrayed a collection of canned fruits and vegetables, potatoes, peas, molasses, onions, corn, meal, etc.

The youngsters Help. About the most impressive touching item on the records of the "store" is that which shows that 681 articles and packages were given by the school children of Shelby. The youngsters came through before they had their Christmas in fine style. Over 2,000 other articles and packages, containing all types of food and clothing, came in from other sources. And packages are still coming in. Eieren farmers last week did their bit to help by bringing in potatoes, molasses, tomatoes, vegetables and onions.

Approximately \$3,000 in food has been sent in or pledged and this is being used for medicine and other urgent help and for clothes, food and fuel where applicants cannot be fitted in the headquarters storeroom.
