



Three years ago, before North Carolina passed a law making marriage in this State more difficult and more expensive, around 200 marriage license were sold each year-the total never falling below bers selling a number over 200. But the structer marriage laws started the lovelorn couples to South Carolina. Year before last the total dropped off here, and last year it dropped off even more, but local matrimonial stock, as the market experts put it, dropped to a new ow level in 1931. Sixty-nine marriage licenses in a year is only beween four and five per month.






