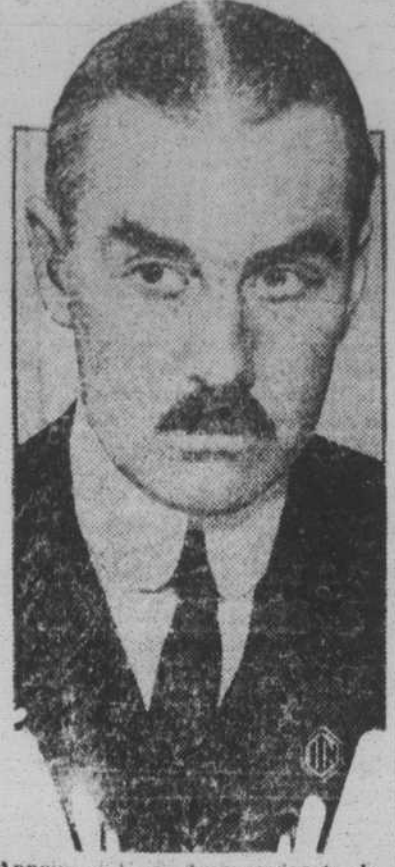
## Hopper Home Burns At Poplar Springs
