Coxey Desires To Be A Candidate In N. C. For President

Leader Of Famous "Army" Writes Hartness For Information.

Raleigh.—Jacob Seeliger Coxey, Sr., mayor of Massillon, Ohio, leader in 1894 of "Coxey's army" which marched to Washington asking jobs for the laboring man, has sought information in regard to becoming a republican candidate for president in North Carolina.

"General" Coxey asked Secretary of State James A. Hartness what was necessary for entry in the "presidential primary" in this state. North Carolina does not have a presidential primary. Election officials say Coxey could seek the presidential electors votes in this state only as the choice of the republican convention, as an independent, or as the acknowledged candidate of some other party.

Fortunes Are Made By Men Who Salvage Sea Wrecks

There is always a fascination in getting something for nothing or a lot for a very little. Such a case is recorded in a recent British Blue book. The wreck of H. M. S. Bulwark, blown up near Sheerness early in the war, was sold to a shipbreaking firm for \$2,500.

The company had hardly started work before they recovered a water-tight case holding \$2,500 in Bank of England notes. So, with the purchase price in their pocket, all the rest was clear profit.

There is no bigger gamble than buying a wreck. Another storm may blow up and sweep away the remains, leaving the unfortunate purchaser with a dead loss. Or, on the other hand, the weather may be kind, and he may make a fortune out of his purchase.

A little more than a year ago the Hull trawler Mex Pemberton steamed into Grimaby. This vessel wrecked off Iceland in 1927, was given up as a total loss, and an Icelandic farmer bought her at auction for \$25.00. He patched her up, refloated her, and towed her into harbor. Then he sold her at a huge profit. The new owner sent her to Grimaby to be overhauled.

Even more romantic is the case of the Barbaric, a good-sized brig, which foundered in a gale off Seawell, Nova Scotia. A fisherman named Burns wanted her anchors. As she was in deep water and it would cost almost what they were worth to get them up. The wreck was sold to him for five dollars.

Burns got a diver from Halifax and, within a few weeks got up \$18,000 in gold from the wreck. Since then he has found another six thousand.

The Jean Bart, a French vessel, was on a voyage from Antwerp to Australia laden with three thousand tons of pig iron when she ran aground on Wandang Island, in Spencer Gulf, South Australia. Her hold filled, and as it seemed impossible to float her, it was decided that the wreck should be sold by auction. She was bought by Messrs. Bell, a firm of Melbourne grain merchants, for \$1,840, and critics laughed, telling them they had wasted their money.

Messrs. Bell said nothing, but sent a diver down, who reported that the only damage was a hole a foot in diameter, which could easily be repaired. It was repaired, the water was pumped out, and the vessel was stowed into Melbourne where she was sold for \$60,000.

Perhaps the record in profit on a transaction of this kind happened in 1915, when a British steamer stranded on the Argentine coast was sold as she lay for \$7,500 to a Dutch firm. They raised and repaired her and used her in trade. The submarine menace sent up the price of ships, and the lucky gamblers sold the ship for the immense sum of \$1,600,000.
