Women Desire To Gets Loans Available

Pleas For Equal Rights in Methodist Church Voiced at Missionary Council Meeting.

Atlanta, Ga.—The failure of the Southern Methodist church to ordain women as ministers is under protest.

Pleas for equal rights with men in the church were voiced here at a sectional meeting of the woman's missionary council of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, by two leaders.

Mrs. W. B. Landrum, corresponding secretary of the central Texas conference, charged that while trained women have been received in the profession, business and industry, the church alone bars "her from attaining her highest usefulness."

The protest against discrimination because of sex was joined by Mrs. J. C. Handy of Jefferson, Texas, vice-president of the council.

An appeal for women to influence public opinion against lynching was made before the council delegates by Mrs. Jesse Daniel Ames of Atlanta, secretary of woman's work on the commission on inter-racial cooperation.

An appropriation of \$559,957.81 was voted by the council to carry on missionary work in foreign countries during the coming year. The figure was 6 per cent below last year's total.

Judge Webb asked that an order be drawn and mailed to him at his home in Shelby referring the matter to R. Marion Ross, referee in bankruptcy here. Judge Webb came down from Shelby especially for the hearing, which began at 10 o'clock.

Maxwell Opposed To Any Sales Tax Plan

Candidate Maxwell, judging by remarks he made in a Shelby speech several nights ago, is still much opposed to a sales tax for the federal government and for the state government. He says a federal sales tax would be bad enough but that a state sales tax would be even more "obnoxious."

That is not going to do the commissioner much good down East where the people are determined to free their land from all taxation at the expense of other property. It will no doubt arouse the ire of those newspapers of the state which will take this form of taxation or any other to get land free of taxation. It will bring down upon his head the wrath of that element in the last general assembly which fought for five bitter months to put across just such a tax as he describes as "obnoxious."

"The people of this country should not permit the desire to maintain the spending of the federal government on an extravagant basis to drive them into the adoption of these more odious and burdensome than war taxes and to set up as the major course of federal revenue a tax that gets 80 per cent of its revenue from people whose incomes are less than \$3,000 a year—which is what this 2 1/2 per cent general sales tax does," the commissioner said.
