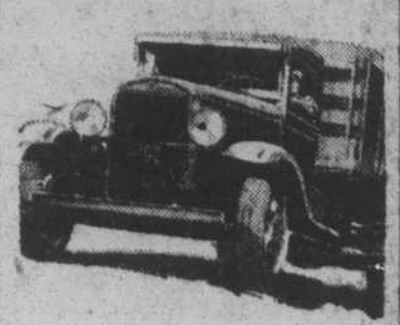

Col. Cleveland Terror To Tories

(Another of a series of historical articles written for The Star by V. E. White, county historian of Lattimore.)

Colonel Cleveland did not long retain this command at Bethabara. Soon he was succeeded by Colonel Martin Armstrong, the local commander of Surry county where the troops and prisoners then were. But Cleveland continued his activities in a partisan way on behalf of the patriot cause.

Shortly after being relieved of his command at Bethabara an incident occurred which showed how Colonel Cleveland dealt with outlaws. In November, 1780, James Cowles and John Brown, two notorious Tory plunderers, passed through Lincoln county and robbed the house of Major George Wilfong of everything they could carry off; not only did they do this, but they also took away two of Wilfong's horses. Major Wilfong with a party pursued the culprits, overtaking them near Wilkesboro, where the horses were recovered, but the plunderers made good their escape. Not long after this however, when the robbers were returning toward Ninety-six, they were captured by some of Cleveland's scouts and brought back to Wilkesboro. It was customary in those days to hang prisoners guilty of such offenses as these men had committed, and Cleveland quickly disposed of them in that way.

Early in 1781 Colonel Cleveland decided to unite with the regular American army. So with one hundred riflemen he joined General Greene, the new patriot commander in the South. While he was serving under Greene, Cleveland participated in a part of the campaign against Lord Cornwallis. After the American victories at Kings Mountain and Cowpens, Cornwallis made a desperate effort to destroy the largest Whig army in the South, but the wily Greene outmaneuvered the British commander throughout their campaign. Though the Americans were more than holding their own with the enemy, Colonel Cleveland for some unexplained reason did not choose to remain in this service. So shortly before the historic battle of Guilford Court House, he withdrew from the regular patriot army. But this does not mean that the vigilant Cleveland ceased in his efforts for independence. Following his withdrawal from General Greene's army, he resumed his active partisan warfare for which he was so well fitted by nature. Until the close of the war the name of "Old Round About" Cleveland, as he was called, was a terror to Carolina Tories.
