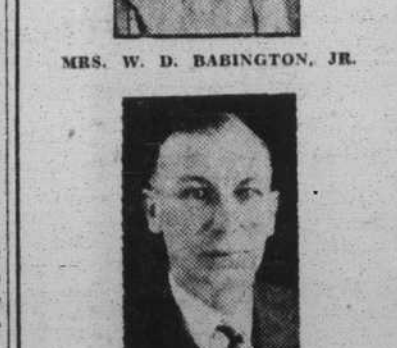
Mr. Thad Ford returned home last night from the Charlotte Sanatorium where he has been taking treatment for the past few days.
