Fight Show To Be Held In New Armory Here Friday Night, April 15.

Fistic fans of the Shelby section will get to see some of their home-town favorites in action in the boxing show scheduled for the company armory in the Gardner building next Friday night, April 15.

The program will be sponsored by the militia company and will include five high-class bouts.

Tommy Headliner.

Tommy McCarver, Shelby's south-paw slugger who is catching the eye of many boxing promoters, will get his first chance to be a headliner in a big show. The Shelby boy is booked to meet Johnny Gill, Italian fighter of Newark, N. J., in the main bout. Both boys tip the scales at 144 and the matchmakers believe it will be a real go-wild, plenty of action. The Italian is the more experienced fighter, having battled around the cage of the big time in the New York and New Jersey sector, but Tommy is believed to have the best punch and enough gameness to make up for his lack of experience in fast company.

Other Bouts.

A Shelby or Cleveland county boy will be seen in each of the five bouts. All the local favorites are booked and with outsiders. The list includes Jerome Spangler, Albert White, the one and only "Bar" Huffman, and Lawdale's prize jumping Jimmy Pearson.

Albert White, the husky Shelby boy, meets "Lightning" Rose, of Gastonia, in the semi-final.

Jerome Spangler tackles Kayo Clement, another Gastonia, youngster. And, of all things, "Bar" Huffman is booked to meet a Gastonia lad known as "Baby Face" Beacom. Jimmy Pearson's opponent will be "Runt" Elridge.

The show will be handled by the same matchmaker who put on such an interesting card here two weeks ago. The class of that program awakened a new interest in boxing here and the presence on the card of five home boys should pack the fans in the new armory tonight week.

Spring Tourney Begins Thursday At Cleveland Springs, Qualifying On.

The annual spring tournament of the Cleveland Springs golf club will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week. It was announced today by Spurgeon Hewitt, club secretary, Bob Reed, professional, and the tournament committee.

The tournament will be a flight affair instead of a handicap meet and it is hoped to have every member of the club participate.

Four Flights. It is planned to have four flights and a special flight with prizes for winners and runners-up in each flight. A committee began work today lining up prizes for the various flights and the winners are assured enticing honors.

Qualify Now. The qualifying rounds begin today and club members may turn in their qualifying score any day through Wednesday of next week, but if possible all entrants are urged to play their qualifying round by Tuesday. After the qualifying rounds the entrants will be placed in flights according to their score. The "scratch" players will go in the special flight and the first flight will be made up of the players with the next eight low scores. The second flight will be composed of another eight and so on down. All qualifying scores are to be turned in to Bob Reed, the club pro.

Women To Play.

The feminine members of the club will open their tournament at the same time and are to qualify by next Thursday morning. It is hoped to have two or three flights for the women and prizes have already been secured for the winners of the flights. A full list of the prizes will be announced early next week. Scores in qualifying rounds for the women are also to be turned in to the club professional so that he may arrange the flights.

That's what Shelby fans are saying about Casey Morris' kid team at the high school this year after seeing the game youngsters come from behind to score three runs in the last of the ninth for a win over Forest City.

Will Win Some.

Today the youngsters are playing Gastonia at Gastonia. The home fans will get to see them in action again Tuesday afternoon in the local lot. The opposition will be furnished by Cherryville and that means a good crowd and much interest, for rivalry between the schools has been high since back in the days when Grover Friday and the Cherryville team were battling some of the best teams Shelby ever produced.

Cocher Morris isn't even thinking of a championship. The boys he says, will develop plenty as the season wears along and they have already developed remarkably. The Forest City game showed that.

"Can't expect anything like a championship team with only two players from last year left and the remainder mere boys," the coach says. "And you can't win championships without pitchers. Williams has the making of a good hurler, but he can't pitch em all, and that's what do we have? Dick Newton to pull in from the outfield without any pitching experience. But they'll win some and when they don't they'll give the crowds entertainment by fighting until the last out."

Good Prospects.

A couple years of play should make good players out of several of the youngsters. Jolley, the grid and cage star, is a good hitter and a coming shortstop although a bit shaky on hot rollers. He has an arm that can make up for slight juggles. One of the most pleasing developments is that of R. K. Wilson, the young catcher who came up from the Legion junior team. He is a nifty receiver, fast on his feet and has a good arm.

"Whitey" Sparks, the third-fourth of the Sparks brothers to play at Shelby high is coming along fast on first. He is another junior legion player and, like his brothers, can hit the ball on the nose. He is not at home as yet with his footwork around first but seems to be improving.

The return of Bill Harrill to the lineup added punch to the batting order. In his first game Bill hammered out two triples and hit something happens should be the most consistent hitter on the team. Dick Newton can still lambast the ball. Several of the others stand up and take real cuts at the horsehide and should get their nitting eye in another game or two. In Blanton Morehead, Kale, Fair, and others there should be hitting power by mid-season.

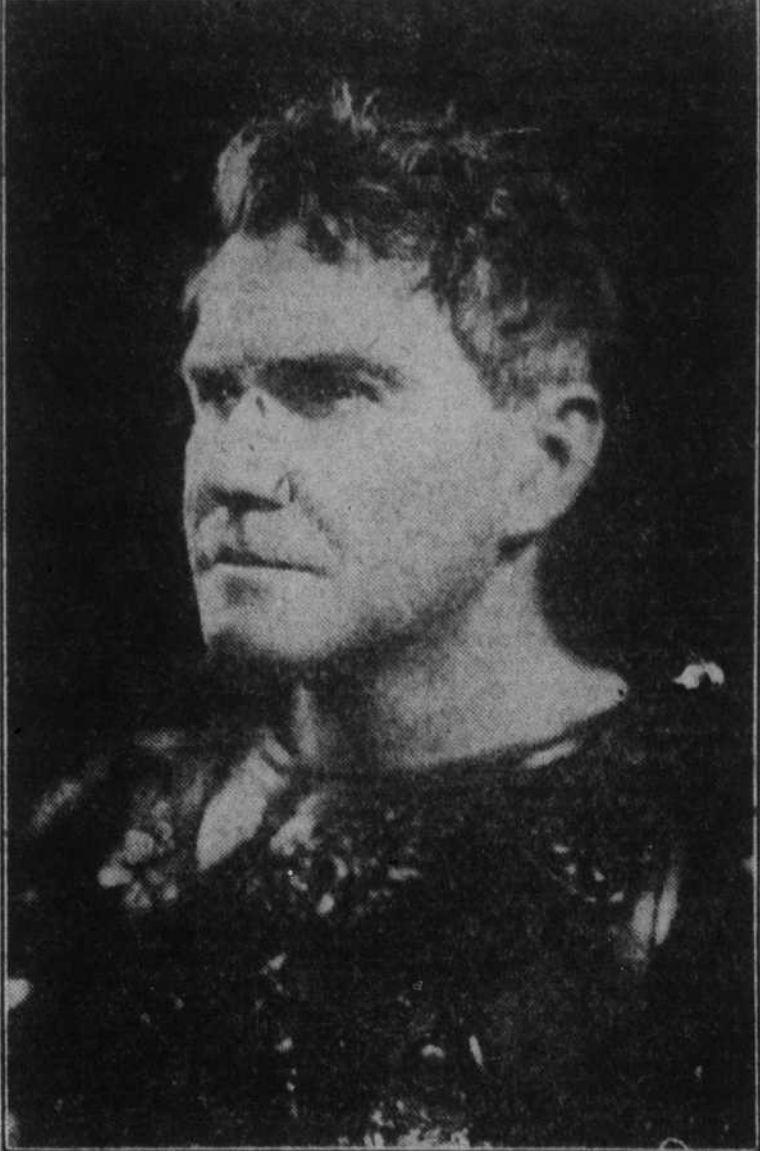

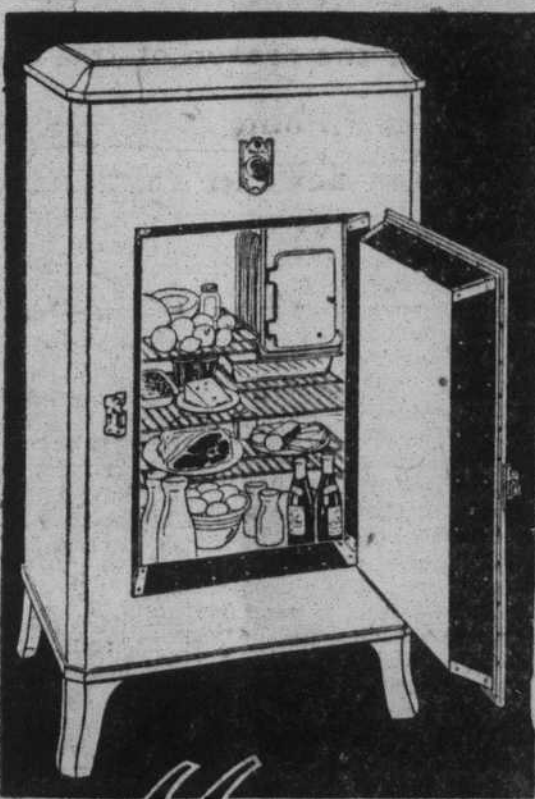
Plays Part Of Pontius Pilate
