Grist Challenges Morrison Again

Would Debate Senior Senator In Three Public Speeches In State

Charlotte.—Challenging Cameron Morrison to a series of three debates during which he is promised to reiterate to the senator's face charges that he is subservient to the power interests, Frank D. Grist, candidate for Morris's seat, said he had sent the following telegram: "Hon. Cameron Morrison, U. S. Senate, Washington, D. C.

"Since you resent that you are controlled by the big interests, particularly the power trust, will you not face the charge before an audience of your constituents instead of hurling the lie at your opponents from behind their backs? Will you deny making the statement that the Duke Power company is almost a religious and benevolent organization? You have said that you are a substantial stockholder in the Duke Power company. Will you deny this? Will you join me in a series of three debates, date and place to be selected by you, and let the public decide who is the liar and coward that you have been talking about. You may reply to Winston-Salem."

A farmer living between Goodsonville and High Shoals stated this morning that his wheat, oats and rye were badly damaged by the hail stones which cut thousands of stalks off at the ground. Skylights in Lander & Ramsey Hardware stores were broken.

The ground in Lincolnton was covered at one time with ice balls as large as partridge eggs.


