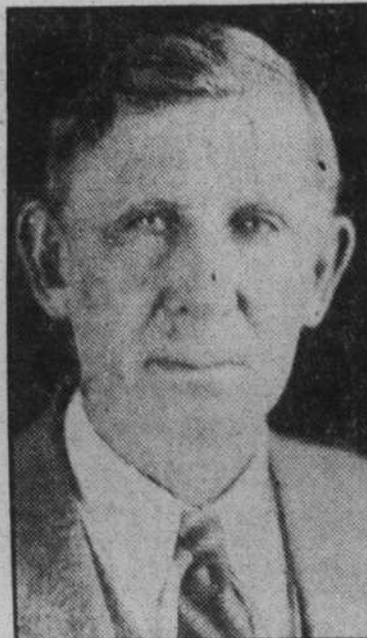

Wrath of Speakers At Presbyterian Meet Unleashed on Divorce And Writers.

Denver.—Prevailing trends of modern life were heavily scored at a session of the 144th general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A.

Divorce, the radio, movies, pro-

hibition and Sunday amusements were targets for speakers' wrath. The entire scheme of things was summed up by the Rev. William Chalmers Covert of Philadelphia as a "culture without Christ."

"We have," he declared, "Christless men of letters, Christless professors and philosophers; Christless politicians in business and Christless politicians. We have sophisticated writers exploiting in books and

magazines pagan ideals of thought. Godless schemes of philosophy, cynical creeds, articles full of disillusionment and despair, immortal codes of marriage and social living."

## Divorces Gain In N. C., Says Report

New York.—North Carolina, despite the fact that divorce is allowed only for infidelity or five years desertion, reflects the nation's ris-

ing divorce rate, according to a statistical survey announced here by Dr. Alfred Cahen, assistant statistician for the president's research committee on social trends.

Dr. Cahen finds the North Carolina city with the highest divorce rate is Durham, with 1.33 divorces per thousand 1930 population. Char-

lotte's ratio is .69 per thousand; Asheville 1.16; Greensboro .80; Salisbury .37; Raleigh .88; Wilmington .72; and Winston-Salem .76.

"At present, about 13 percent of all American marriages end in divorce," and Dr. Cahen estimated that by 1965 51 percent will so end.
