Smithfield, June 20.—In May Barney W. Lane of near Dens Mill called H. A. Stancil, of Kenly, route two, to treat one of his fox dogs. When Mr. Stancil arrived at Mr. Lane's home the dog had been dead about an hour. Mr. Lane asked him to cut open and see if he could locate the trouble. When he cut into the dog he saw something move and discovered a 36-inch snake wrapped around the dog's liver. The snake coiled on the ground after it was removed from the dog but soon died. It had eaten three places in the dog's liver, the largest place being as large as a half dollar bill.

Mr. Stancil states that this is the third snake he has taken from dogs bitten by snakes where the dogs were never treated for poison.

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Soldiers' Bonus Is Killed By Senate

Body Crushing Defeats Bill To Pay Veterans. No Disorder Reported.

Washington, June 18.—The soldiers' bonus will not be paid this summer.

Definitely crushing, the senate late last night defeated the bill by which thousands upon thousands of veterans of the World War had hoped to draw immediately almost two and a half billions in cash from the federal treasury.

The tremendous margin of 62 to 18 was rolled up against the measure despite an amazingly day-long siege which nearly ten thousand clamorous ex-service men laid down upon America's capitol. It was evident that the decision turned principally on the issue of safeguarding the nation's financial stability. Senator after senator gave as

explanation for his adverse vote this reason, divorced entirely from the merits of giving aid to the veterans.

Cheers And Boos Heard The fateful roll call was counted out under galleries packed solid with former soldiers. Hundreds more pressed up to the senate doors, and from the outside were plainly audible the songs, cheers and boos of thousands who swarmed over the broad plaza, blocking all traffic but causing no disorder and voting no threats.

To make double sure that the bill would not come up again this session, its opponents resorted to strategy which is as rare in the United States senate as it is effective: Tabling a motion to reconsider passage. This extinguished the last hope of sponsors to bring the question up later.
