To Bury Fountain Under Avalanche Of Votes For Ehringhaus

Little Sentiment Seen For Candidate For Governor In Second Race.

Concord Tribune.—Still apparently "mad" at what he terms "the machine" in North Carolina, Lieutenant Governor Fountain has decided to enter the second primary, although he trailed J. C. B. Ehringhaus by approximately 47,000 votes in the first primary.

Mr. Fountain has the right to run if he's not satisfied with the licking administered on June 4th, but the Democratic party in the state would have been in more strategic position if as many contests as possible had been avoided. You can't go before the people with lot of personal bitterness which is reflected in personalities, without stirring up some trouble.

The trouble seems to be that Mr. Fountain can't understand that the majority of the people don't want him. He talks about the votes Mr. Ehringhaus didn't get a showing the people are against the "machine", but he says nothing about the votes Mr. Ehringhaus did get. And surely the Rocky Mount candidate doesn't mean to tell the voters of North Carolina that they didn't know what they were doing on June 4th.

It seems almost a certainty that Mr. Fountain will get but small part of the Maxwell vote. In fact, we believe that should he feel called to do so, Mr. Maxwell would ask his followers to support the Elizabeth City man. In Cabarrus, for instance, Mr. Ehringhaus received approximately 3000 votes. Mr. Maxwell about 2250 and Mr. Fountain 154. We believe if the same number of voters should go to the polls for the run-off—and they won't—that Mr. Ehringhaus would get fully 90 percent of the Maxwell votes. Cabarrus people weren't trying to "spank" Governor Gardner of the Democratic administration by voting for Mr. Maxwell. Instead they thought they were supporting the man best able to carry the state through a trying period.

And now that Mr. Fountain has decided to see that the thing through we hope the voters will see to it that he is through. For the average candidate a licking of 47,000 would be enough, but not so with Mr. Fountain. His ego won't let him think that North Carolinians were serious about this matter of retiring him to private life. So the best thing the party can do now is to bury him under such an avalanche of Ehringhaus votes that will still him for all time to come.

Camp Has Been Named "McDougal" In Honor Of First Hoke County Soldier To Die.

Fort Bragg, June 20.—The Citizens' Military Training camp opened at Fort Bragg on June 14. In accordance with the custom started last year by the Post Commander, Brig. Gen. Manus McCloskey, of naming the camp each year after some Carolina hero of the World war, the camp this year has been named Camp McDougal in honor of the first Hoke county soldier to lose his life in the great war.

When the bugler blew "taps" on June 14th, a total of 732 young Carolinians from practically every section of both states, had arrived at Fort Bragg, been examined physically, clothed in full uniform, assigned to batteries, and sent to bed with their "tummies" full of good wholesome "chow."

The following morning the entire regiment, under their officers, and led by the Camp Commandant, Lt. Col. Charles S. Blake, marched to the Post Theatre for the welcoming addresses and oath of enrollment. The 17th Field Artillery band opened the program with that rousing French march of World war fame, the "Somme et Meuse," after which Gen. McCloskey, a veteran of four wars and recipient of many wounds in battle, delivered a ringing and inspiring address of welcome to his "comrades" of the 1932 C. M. T. C.
