Think Mellon To Resign Job Soon As English Envoy

Daily Herald Says It Thinks U. S. Ambassador to London Wants Younger Man to Take Post.

London.—The Daily Herald says Ambassador Andrew W. Mellon "is expected to resign" when he arrives in Washington his present trip to the United States. "It is believed he will tell President Hoover the coming negotiations on war debts should be in the hands of a younger man than he," the Herald added.

The London newspapers have been making something of a mystery of the ambassador's trip home ever since he left a week ago today, declaring he was going to the United States for a holiday, taking advantage of a dull period in embassy work.

He himself said the trip had no political significance. However, his leaving was coupled with the departure of the British ambassador, Sir Ronald Lindsay, from Washington and other newspaper besides the Herald printed dispatches from New York and Washington on the coincidence.

Before he left here the ambassador indicated to his associates he intended to remain in the United States two or three weeks and be back in London before the end of August. So far as was known in official circles here today his plans have not been changed.

There has been no official intimation whatever that he had any intention of relinquishing his post. The visit is purely personal it was said, and was planned some time ago.

'Too Smart' Gangster's Nemesis Devotee of Mountie Tradition

Young Sleuth Who Out-Shot "Fats" McCarthy Has Been Shot on Three Occasions, But Always Got His Man. When "Target" Gets Sharpshooter—That's News.

In sharp contrast to the career of "Fats" McCarthy, New York gang leader who met the inevitable end of a life of crime when he died with a police bullet in his heart at Albany, N. Y., is that of the young police hero who tackled him down and killed him in a pistol duel to the death. Detective Harry Moore, although only on the police force since 1924, has already been shot on three occasions while rounding up bad men. But each time he succeeded in capturing the man who shot him. When he stopped the first gang bullet, back in 1926, he was carried into the French Hospital, New York, more dead than alive. But Cupid pulled him back from the brink of the grave. He fell in love with his nurse, Helen Morgan, with the result that she is now Mrs. Moore. The young sleuth was assigned the task of bringing in McCarthy after the gangster had slain Detective Guido Passagno, last October. McCarthy was also under suspicion for the Harlem baby massacre last Summer. Moore stuck tenaciously to the trail of the gang leader, who boasted he was "too smart to be taken by a dumb cop," for ten months until he cornered him at Albany. In the ensuing gun battle Moore was wounded three times, but he succeeded in planting a bullet in McCarthy's heart. Mrs. Jean McCarthy, the badman's wife, was wounded in the fight and she and several of the trapped gang surrendered and were taken in custody.

Even Mild Cases of Scarlet Fever Are Very Contagious

Great Increase of Cases in Recent Months Makes It Highly Important That Every Patient Be Quarantined and Given Proper Treatment.

THERE has been an alarming increase in the number of cases of scarlet fever reported from all over the country within the past few months. Fortunately, most of the cases were of a mild form.

Scarlet fever is a highly contagious disease. It is often neglected and in this way is quickly spread from one child to another. Quarantine is necessary for all cases. Children who recover from scarlet fever should not be permitted to return to school without presentation of a physician's certificate.

The disease comes on suddenly and the first symptoms noted are vomiting, sore throat, headache and fever. The rash of scarlet fever appears within twenty-four hours and is first seen on the neck and upper part of the chest. It is bright red in color and gradually spreads over the entire body. The rash lasts from three to ten days and then fades. After this the skin peels in scales or large pieces, producing what is called desquamation.

Mild cases of scarlet fever require little treatment besides rest in bed and isolation; but please bear in mind that mild cases are quite as contagious as severe cases. Though
