Jackson, Miss. — The \$50,000 "dreamhouse" of former Gov. Theo G. Bilbo of Mississippi, built while he was in office as a culmination of the "dream of a life time" has been ordered sold at auction to satisfy judgment on a \$90 note against him in federal district court.

The sale was ordered on decree of Judge Edwin R. Holmes, to take place at Poplarville tomorrow. With the house will go Bilbo's 3,000-acre plantation. Pestilence In New Bonus Army Camp Threatens

Conditions Described As Bad In New Pennsylvania Camp Filled With Vets.

Johnstown, Pa., Aug. 3.—The specter of pestilence moved Monday night through the down-at-heel camp of the bonus expeditionary force on the outskirts of Johnstown.

Medical investigators said after a tour of the billets that conditions are "bad—very bad, and dangerous" to the health of the campers. More than 7,000 men, women and children are encamped and others are arriving hourly.

Signs of dissatisfaction and impatience were evident. Complaints were made to Matthew Burke, finance officer, and R. B. Ellison, national contact officer, that some of the men have not had any food for two days.

Leaders of the B. E. F. received in silence a telegram from Gen. Smedley Butler admonishing them to arrange for the veterans to return to their home states. Butler wired from Newton Square, Pa., in reply to an invitation to visit the camp.

Watch For Communists. While the situation at the camp grew more serious hourly, police in Johnstown were on the alert to check any spread of communism.

Eddie McCloskey, aggressive red-headed mayor, warned he "absolutely will not permit any meeting of 'reds.'" Nevertheless, reports filtered through a demonstration would be attempted.

Tobacco Warehouses At Reidsville Burn

Reidsville, Aug. 2.—Fire today destroyed three large tobacco sheds here belonging to J. H. Burton and Company, Inc., which estimated the damage done at "over \$100,000."

The sheds contained approximately 1,500,000 pounds of tobacco in store trucks.

Two small dwellings nearby also were destroyed by the flames which sprang from an undetermined origin.

A small amount of insurance was carried on the tobacco sheds.
