

Norris, Progressive G. O. P., Works For Roosevelt; Will Stump Nation

Veteran Republican Will Back Democrats Because Of Progressive Ideas.

Washington, Sept. 28.—A nationwide speaking tour by Senator George W. Norris, Nebraska republican, in behalf of Governor Roosevelt's presidential candidacy was sponsored this week by the national progressive league.

It said in a formal statement the organization was created under Norris' leadership to support the democratic nominee "and the progressive principles for which he stands."

"The league is non-partisan in policy and its activities are confined solely to economic issues," the statement said.

Norris, veteran independent, already had announced his support of Roosevelt. In 1928 he bolted the republican ticket to support Alfred E. Smith against Herbert Hoover.

The league said Norris will begin a coast-to-coast tour October 15 and that other speakers also will take part.

Free Storage Of Wheat Is Provided

French Government Opening Up Barnacks For Use of Farmers.

(By Richard D. McMillan.)

Paris, Sept. 28.—The French army has come to the assistance of the French farmer by opening up its barracks granaries to enable the farmers to store wheat free of charge, thereby keeping it off the market and preventing dumping.

With a crop of over 30,000,000 quintals, France has more wheat than she will be able to use. Since the crop was gathered, wheat prices have been decreasing, despite the government's attempts to bolster the price. The price at approximately \$1.35 the bushel, still remains far above the world market quotation, but the French farmer, whose vote can make or break a political party, is crying out his need for a return to the old price, which was well over 100 per cent higher than at Chicago.

The minister of agriculture in the Herriot government, M. Abel Gardey, has evolved a scheme of financial assistance for the farmer to enable him to have credits to store his grain. Storage facilities, however, are lacking, which explains why the government has authorized the
