Praises Work of State University

Responsible For Two-Thirds Of State's Progress Says Atlantic Editor.

Chapel Hill.—"North Carolina has made more progress in the last 25 years than any other Southern state, and I believe 66 2/3 per cent of that progress has been due to the University of North Carolina," Ellery Sedgwick, editor of the Atlantic Monthly, said in an interview after spending a week in the village.

Mr. Sedgwick came to Chapel Hill to enter a son, Cabot Sedgwick, in the University. He came to stay just a couple of days. Instead he stayed a week and expressed the desire to stay much longer.

"I like the atmosphere of Chapel Hill, its whole-ome university community," he said before leaving yesterday. "It has the simplicity and naturalness of Amherst."

Mr. Sedgwick wanted it understood that he was breaking a tradition in sending his son to Carolina, and he was proud to do so. The Sedgwicks all are Harvard men, he explained. His father, his grandfather, and he, himself, and another son all were Harvard graduates.
