102 Year Old Negro Goes County Home

Albert Johnson Finds Shelter For
Winter. Worked For Three
Generations of Beams.

Albert Johnson, colored, says he
is 102 years old. He looks as if he
might have passed the century
mark and white friends believe Al-
bert has his age down about right.
He has been living on Shovine
Beams' farm in the New Prospect
community. Being in a house by
himself with no one to look after
him, it was thought best to bring
him to the county home and Albert
entered the institution Monday.

Johnson is a happy old soul and
was smoking a cigar which some
friend gave him. He has worked
for the Beams for three gener-
ations, back as far as David Beams
with whom he used to wrestle as a
young man. The war came on
and Johnson served Dr. Monroe and
his brother Capt. Monroe. Johnson
is unable to say what section the
Monroes hailed from, but he says
he served Dr. Monroe in his "doc-
tor shop" while the Confederate
army camped around Petersburg
and fought the Yankees.

Since the war most of his life
has been spent in the New Pros-
pect section. He remembers work-
ing for Mr. Fronberger at the old
paper mill on Buffalo where the
Buffalo cotton mill is now located.
Johnson says he was "boss" of the
mill.

If Johnson's contention as to his
age is correct, he is the oldest liv-
ing resident of Cleveland county.

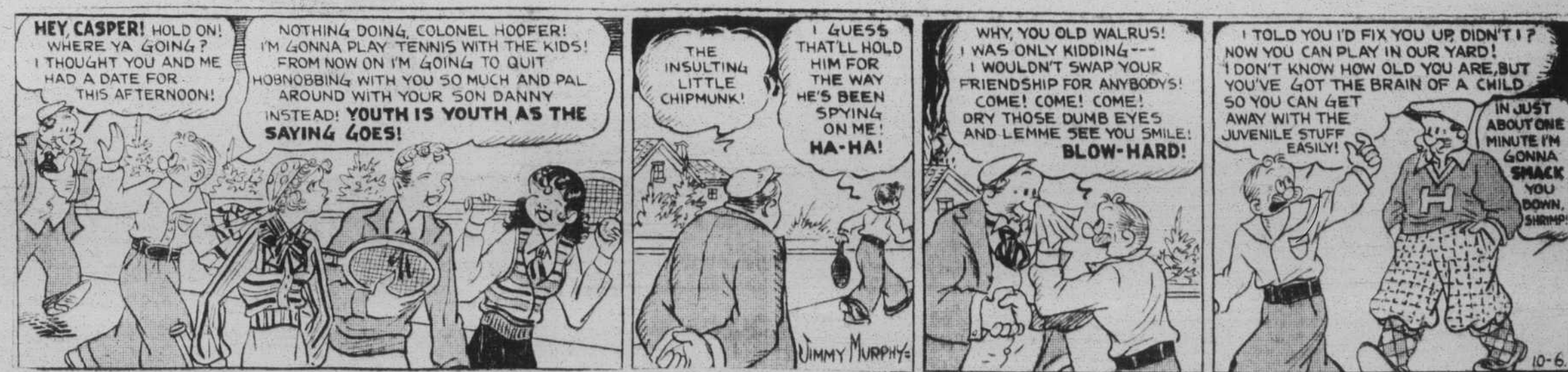
