reading: "This Ford votes for Roosevelt."

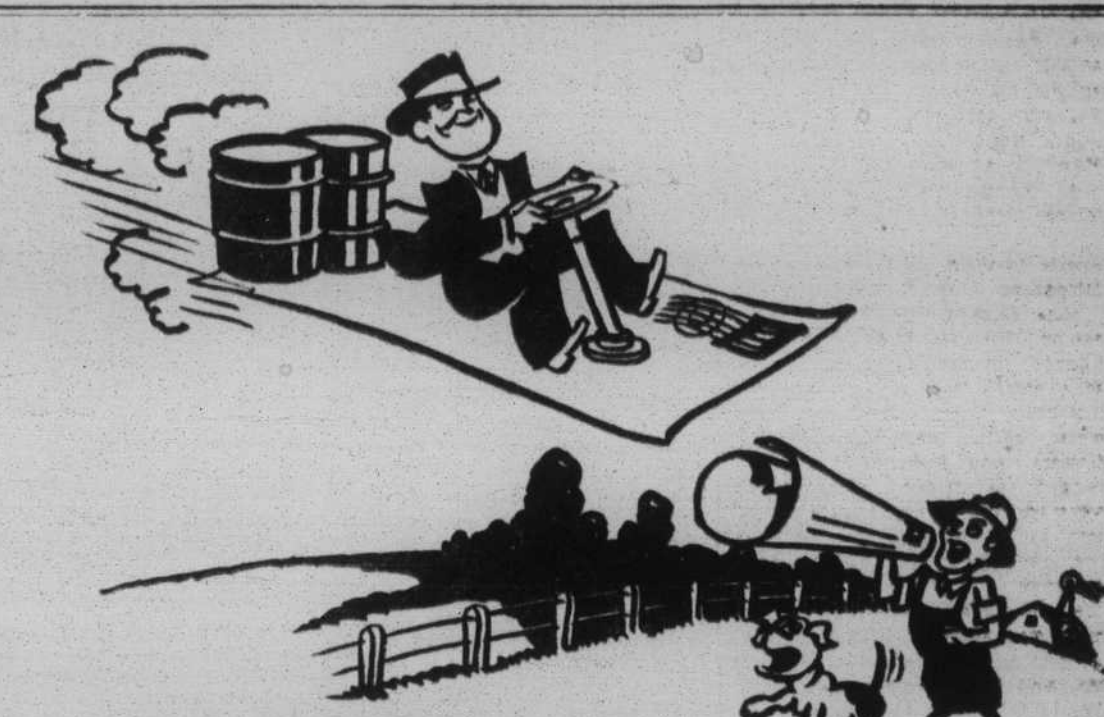
